Reconnecting a Community to the Creek: JJ Seabrook Stream Restoration and Rain Garden Project

A new project in East Austin will transform an unremarkable reach of Tannehill Branch into a thriving creek corridor that will benefit the environment and the local community. The JJ Seabrook Stream Restoration and Rain Garden Project goals include reducing pollution from urban runoff and restoring the ecology and stability of the stream system.

The project will include environmental features such as a restored channel, riparian parkland and woodland corridors, rain gardens, and bioswales. Bioswales are landscape features that use native vegetation to filter pollutants and regulate stormwater flows. It will have amenities like strategically placed boulder crossings and a greenbelt trail system that meanders with the creek to provide opportunities for exploration and leisurely strolls.

The project will remove a road that was cut through the park in the late 1960s to accommodate traffic from Robert Mueller Airport. Removing the roadway will create a unified park that has been divided for more than 40 years. It will bring the neighborhood together by creating a unique sense of place for the community to reconnect with the creek.


The JJ Seabrook Neighborhood has taken an active role in working with the City on the project plans. In fact, Watershed Protection Department (WPD) team members have attended monthly neighborhood meetings and park volunteer days to listen to the community's vision for the area. WPD has also used the neighborhood meetings as a forum for educational outreach. At one meeting, staff showed homeowners how to build a rain garden with the message, "there is strength in numbers – the more the community can build and take ownership of their watershed, the cleaner our local creeks will be." The partnership between the neighborhood and the City continues to grow, and neighbors are seeking opportunities to volunteer for planting days and assist with water quality monitoring.

Shade Tree Mechanic Program Helps Reduce Pollution

Are you one of those dying breed who likes to tinker with automobile repair? Don't mind getting grease under your fingernails? If so, you may qualify for being a part of the City's Shade Tree Mechanic Program. Whether changing motor oil or replacing an entire engine, Shade Tree mechanics know there's no better repair shop than your own garage.

The Shade Tree Mechanic Program is designed to help home mechanics be environmentally responsible. The program will help you properly dispose of motor oil, filters, batteries, antifreeze and tires, typically **free** of charge. You will receive a free five-gallon yellow bucket to store waste oil and other auto fluids. The bucket's lid is designed to be a drain pan for oil changes. When the bucket is full, you can take it to an auto parts stores or lube shop to be dispose of properly.



Improper disposal of used oil and other auto fluids pose a direct threat to the environment and can lead to costly cleanups that can impact everyone. Spilled fluids and improperly stored chemicals can travel to Austin's storm drains and flow into creeks. The oil from a single oil change can contaminate one MILLION gallons of fresh water!

Follow these tips to help reduce pollution:

- Never dispose of car fluids on the ground, in the trash, or in the storm drain.
- Use drip pans to catch leaking or drained fluids.
- Clean spills with an absorbent material such as kitty litter, sawdust or rag; dispose in your trash can.
- Recycle your motor oil, drained oil filters, spent solvent, antifreeze and car batteries. The City provides a list of drop-off locations. www.austintexas.gov/department/austin-resource-recovery/locations
- Place absorbent material or cardboard below your work area.
- Never use motor oil or gasoline to kill weeds.

Free Paint from Austin Resource Recovery



Free paint is available to Austin and Travis County residents who are looking to save money when refurbishing their homes. Austin ReBlend, as the paint is called, is available to nonprofit organizations and to the public for individual projects. The paint is not available to contractors for commercial uses.

Austin ReBlend comes in two colors, Texas Limestone (off white) and Balcones Canyonland (dark beige). You can get the paint in either two or five gallon containers at the City of Austin's Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) facility. The facility is located at 2514 Business Center Dr. in Southeast Austin and is open Tuesdays and Wednesdays 10 a.m. – 6 p.m. and every Saturday 7 a.m. – Noon.

Austin ReBlend is a 100 percent reused product. It is made from paint dropped off at the HHW facility. The paint collected is inspected before it is chosen to be used for Austin ReBlend. It is then consolidated, blended, filtered and packed by trained personnel to ensure a quality product. To date, the HHW has produced about 11,500 gallons of paint, which have been given to more than 600 participants.

Paint accounts for the majority of materials brought to the HHW. Taking your unwanted paint to HHW helps to keep it out of the landfill. Do not put liquid paint in the trash, down the drain or on the ground. Pouring it down the drain, dumping it on the ground, or putting it in the trash can be harmful to the environment. If you buy the right amount of paint, it saves you money and eliminates the need for storage or disposal. Innovative Community Plan - Colony Park Sustainable Community Pilot Project

The beginning of this year marked some welcome news for the historically underserved community of Colony Park. Mayor Lee Leffingwell and other city officials announced a \$3 million grant awarded to the City of Austin from the U.S. Department of

Housing and Urban Development (HUD). Austin was one of twenty seven cities chosen nationwide to receive the HUD Community Challenge grant. The grant will help improve economic development and increase economic competitiveness by connecting housing with transportation, job centers and quality schools in East Austin.

The Community Challenge grant will be used to create a master plan for development of 208 acres of vacant land in the Colony Park community. The master plan will incorporate strategies for energy efficient building design, water conservation and Zero Waste technology. The vision is to create a model for a sustainable and livable mixed-use, mixed-income community in East Austin.

The development of the master plan will be led by the City's Neighborhood Housing and Community Development Office in partnership with the Austin Housing Finance Corp. (AHFC). AHFC will serve as the master developer of the site and as a builder for a portion of the housing. AHFC anticipates partnering with other entities to develop single-family and multi-family housing.

The grant will accelerate already existing private investments in the Colony Park area. The City's investment in this area over the last decade includes a new recreation center, widening and reconstruction of Loyola Lane, and increased animal-control efforts.

The goal is to improve the quality of life for Colony Park. This will be accomplished through a public-private partnership that creates a thriving neighborhood and offers affordable housing for mixed-income families, shopping amenities, and interconnectivity with viable transportation options.
