+ Actively explore the trail (and just off the trail) to illustrate its potential – history of recreation.

Five pools, three merchants districts, multiple historic parks, performance spaces, youth programs (art and recreation), senior programs, cultural facilities, sports facilities, AISD, food production, public transit, bike infrastructure and so much more

St. John's has an active, formalized NH association that does monthly "walks" to bring people together.

St. John's/Bartholomew - trying to gain traction with Sports leagues - soccer

Rising need for youth soccer, as well as a diving program at Bartholomew Park (which is one of the few parks in town that has a diving well (?). We will be advocating a pathway through Bartholomew Park to Tilley Street as highest priority for neighborhood association's improvements. We typically must drive out of the neighborhood to participate in activities.

+ Collecting histories of the communities along the trail is critical, yet there are a lot of different efforts underway.

PARD, UT, Zoning, E4 Youth, Age Well/Live Well, Austin History Center

+ Food production/edible landscape is anchored in both the past and present.

Community garden, SFC, history of fruit trees along Nile Street, currently people forage for pecans, lead nature walks, etc.

+ Go where the communities already are and work with trusted partners.
