BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION:

Architecture:

Two story rectangular plan side gabled brick house with Colonial Revival and Italian Renaissance Revival details. The principal entry is in the right bay of the principal façade, which is projecting with a flat roof and framed with quoins; the entry itself is framed with a flat portico ornamented with a cartouche and garlands. Fenestration on the first floor of the house consists of single Colonial Revival styled 6:6 windows with a keystone above; on the second floor, the windows are paired, with a 4:4 pane configuration. The left bay of the principal façade contains a single-

leaf glazed door framed with sidelights on the first floor and a projecting three sided bay window above.

Historical Associations:

The house was built in 1926 for Col. Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald, a prominent Austin and Dallas newspaperman, and his wife, Donna. The Fitzgeralds had moved to Austin in 1921, when Hugh Fitzgerald became the political and chief editorial writer for the Austin American and Austin Statesman, a position he held until his death in 1936. Fitzgerald, born in South Carolina in 1857, spent his early years in Dallas, and went to work for the Dallas News. In the 1870s, he became the managing editor of the Dallas News, and was one of the youngest managing editors of a major newspaper in the country. He went on become the editor of the Fort Worth Record, then became the owner, editor, and publisher of the Wichita Falls Record News before moving to Austin. He is listed in the 1920 U.S. Census report as living in Fort Worth, where he was a newspaper editor. He was listed as a widower, and apparently lived in a hotel on W. 5th Street there. By 1930, according to the census report, he had married his wife Donna, who was 29 years his junior. The 1930 census report shows the couple living in this house in Austin, which is listed as being worth \$25,000. Hugh Fitzgerald was then 69; Donna Fitzgerald was then 40, and had been born in Texas. He is listed as an editorial writer for a newspaper; she had no occupation listed. While in Austin, he continued to be very active in political circles; his portrait was hung on the State Senate walls in 1931 in recognition of his contributions to Texas journalism and politics. A year after his death in 1936, his widow sold the house to Fred and Alice Gray Upchurch.

Fred Upchurch grew up in Corsicana, Texas, where he practiced law and served as the city's attorney. He and his wife Alice moved to Austin when he accepted a position as an assistant State Attorney General, and he handled oil, gas, and public utility litigation for the Texas Railroad Commission. After World War II, he became a federal attorney, then engaged in private practice in Austin before returning to Corsicana in 1963. His wife, Alice Gray Upchurch, a native of San Saba, Texas, was a noted Texas historian, and wrote several important county histories. The Upchurches sold the house in 1956 to Louis Scott Wilkerson and his wife, Florence.

Louis Scott Wilkerson was born in Beaumont, but grew up in Austin, and graduated from the Harvard University School of Law in 1936. He was the assistant Texas Secretary of State in the 1950s, then engaged in a private law practice until his death in1987. Florence Benson Wilkerson, an Austin native, was the daughter of Walter and Florence Benson, who owned the Benson Publishing Company, one of the state's largest publishers of school texts. After her father's death, Florence and her brother Walter, Jr., took over the business. She sold the house in 2001 to the current owners, Dean and Andrea McWilliams, who founded McWilliams and Associates, a governmental affairs consulting firm.





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Biography of Col. Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald

"State Mourns Passing of Hugh N. Fitzgerald" read the bold headlines on the front page of the May 7, 1936 Austin-American. "Fitz is dead. Fighting Fitz. Kind Fitz. Young Fitz. Loyal Fitz."

Col. Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald (1857-1936) was described as the best-loved newspaperman of all Texas. "His was a brave soul without cruelty, a fine intellect without snobbery--a mental aristocrat who passionately fought for democracy."

Fitzgerald was one of the most distinguished citizens of the state of Texas. Upon his death, the capitol flag was put at half mast, an honor usually reserved for men and women in official life. City hall, as well as many courthouse offices, closed for the morning to honor Fitz.

A native of South Carolina, Fitzgerald came to Texas in his late teens, and quickly reached an important place in both newspaper work and public affairs. He went to work for the Dallas News, and became aligned with a group of state leaders favoring local option (on prohibition), and their efforts resulted in the law and system by which much of Texas was dry under local option (before statewide or federal prohibition days). In his early twenties, Fitzgerald was named managing editor of the Dallas News. It was revolutionary that so young a man would be given this highly responsible executive position on a great daily newspaper. He remained with the Dallas News for many years and became one of the group of newspapermen known throughout the nation (among others such as Louis J. Wortham of Ft. Worth). Fitzgerald went on to become editor of the Fort Worth Record before eventually becoming owner, editor, and publisher of the Wichita Falls Record News.

In 1921, Col. Fitzgerald moved to Austin with his wife, Donna, to become political and chief editorial writer for the Austin Statesman and the Austin American (separate papers in those days). Fitzgerald was a mover and shaker in politics, and his advice was constantly sought. He was never a candidate for office nor an applicant for appointment, but he managed the gubernatorial campaigns of Charles Culberson and Oscar Colquitt. He served as a member of the Texas Historical and Library Commission and was on the board of regents of present-day Texas Women's University. This was his one official public service, having been sought out and appointed by Governor Pat M. Neff. He served two terms, both as chairman, and bore almost as much love and enthusiasm as he carried into his newspaper writing, so much so that a hall on the college campus was named for him.

In 1926, Col. Fitzgerald and his wife built the beautiful Georgian-influenced brick home at 1710 Windsor (the original address being 1322 Windsor). The large white home was a hospitable place with large trees and extensive flower beds. He did some of the flower growing, but felt responsible for it all.

Late in 1927, Col. Fitzgerald completed a book entitled <u>Governors I Have Known</u>. The book was published by The American-Statesman and affiliated newspapers, and widely circulated over the state and among high public officials throughout the nation.

"Flowers for the living"—Col. Fitzgerald made this phrase the motto of his life and work. The phrase caught on, and frequently sounded in legislative halls. In 1931, the State Senate passed "flowers for the living," resolving to hang Col Fitzgerald's portrait on the Senate walls among the pictures of famous statesmen and military heroes of Texas. The following resolution was read by Gov. Dan Moody:

"Texas bas numbered among ber illustrious citizens many whose contributions to civilization will live throughout eternity, and among those, there is none who has impressed his generation as that genial and universally-loved citizen, Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald. Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald has been a factor in moulding public opinion in Texas for half a century."

Col. Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald died in his beloved home at 1710 Windsor Road on May 6, 1936. Among the many notables who served as pallbearers was Governor Dan Moody.

Biographies of Fred and Alice Brown Gray Upchurch

Fred Upchurch attended Corsicana High School, East Texas State University, Cumberland University of Tennessee and the law school of the University of Texas. He received his L.L.D. and Ph.D. degrees from U.T.

Upchurch was admitted to the State Bar of Texas in 1917. During the same year, he was appointed to and accepted a position in the United States Attorney General's Department in Washington, D.C. He later resigned to voluntarily enlist for service in the World War. Mr. Upchurch had a part in some of the battles of the Meuse and the Argonne.

After the war, Mr. Upchurch returned to Corsicana and resumed his law practice. In 1920, he was elected City Attorney of Corsicana.

Judge and Mrs. Upchurch moved to Austin where he became Assistant Attorney General under Attorney General James V. Allred in 1931-32. Upchurch personally handled all litigation for the Texas Railroad commission affecting oil, gas and public utility matters. He engaged in private law practice in Austin, mainly handling oil and gas litigation.

Upchurch served in World War II as a major in the Judge Advocate General's Department. He was assigned as one of the attorneys in the Division of Appeals.

In 1946, Alice Gray Upchurch wrote "A Sketch History of San Saba County" and "A History of Nueces County."

Biography of Louis Scott Wilkerson

Louis Wilkerson was born on September 23, 1915 in Beaumont, Texas. He graduated from Austin High School in 1932 and received his B.A from the University of Texas in 1936 and his law degree from Harvard University in 1936.

During World War II, he served in the Army Air Corps, relaying the positions of German troops in the battle of Anzio during the Italian campaign of 1943. Wilkerson also served in the Judge Advocate General's Office in Great Britain, and attained the rank of Captain.

Mr. Wilkerson served as U.S. Commissioner from 1940 to 1942 and from 1945 to 1946. He was Assistant Secretary of State of Texas from 1953 through 1955 and Parliamentarian of the 53rd Regular Session of the Texas Legislature under Lt. Governor Ben Ramsey.

In 1956-57, he served as President of the Travis County Bar Association, and served as Vice-Chairman of the Corporation Law Revision Committee of the State Bar of Texas in 1960-61. From 1966 until his death in 1987, Mr. Wilkerson had been a partner in the law firm of Sneed, Vine, Wilkerson, Selman and Perry.

Biography of Florence Benson Wilkerson

Florence Benson was from the prominent family of Walter and Florence Brownlee Benson. The Bensons owned Benson Publishing Company and were part owners in Benson Motors with Walter's brother, Madison. The headline for the obituary from the 60's when Walter died read "Publisher Benson Succumbs."

After Florence's father's death, the publishing company was owned by Florence and her brother, Walter Benson, Jr., and it published text books for the State of Texas. Although Walter ran the business, Florence was also active in it, and would proof text books for publication back in the 1980s at her dining room table at 1710 Windsor. Florence and Walter grew up in the Tudor house on West Lynn, just north of Enfield.

Biographies of Dean & Andrea McWilliams

FITZGERALD, HUGH NUGENT (ca. 1857–1936). Hugh Nugent Fitzgerald, journalist, son of William Laurens Fitzgerald, was born in Charleston, South Carolina, probably in 1857. He attended Jesuit College in Ireland. Upon returning to North America he traveled throughout the United States, Mexico, and Canada, working in mining camps and at various occupations. He married Alice Parsons Wood in 1879 in South Carolina. They had two children. The family moved to Texas in 1889, where Fitzgerald began newspaper work, first as a sports writer and later as a political commentator. He became managing editor and staff correspondent on the Dallas Morning News, with which he was associated for fourteen years. In the early 1900s he was employed as editor of the Dallas Times Herald for ten years. He later edited the Fort Worth Record (see FORT WORTH STAR-TELEGRAM) and was owner, publisher, and editor of the Wichita Falls Record News, before he joined the Marsh-Fentress interests and established his home in Austin in 1921; there he was chief editorial writer for the Austin American, the Austin Statesman (see AUSTIN AMERICAN-STATESMAN), and allied newspapers for more than ten years.

Fitzgerald managed the gubernatorial campaigns of Charles A. Culberson and Oscar B. Colquitt, served two terms as a member of the Texas Historical and Library Commission, and was for twelve years a member of the board of regents of the College of Industrial Arts (now Texas Woman's University). From 1925 until 1933 he was president of the board; one of the residence halls at the university is named in his honor. Fitzgerald wrote almost exclusively for newspapers. His other works include Texans and Their State (1918), which he edited with other Texas newspapermen, and Governors I have Known (1927). In February 1931 he was honored by the Texas Senate for his service in journalism, and his portrait was hung on the Senate wall.

Fitzgerald's first wife died in 1910. On April 30, 1921, he married Donna Roberts. He was a Catholic. He died in Austin on May 6, 1936, and was buried in Dallas.
