SUMMARY STAFF RECOMMENDATION: Staff recommends the proposed zoning change from single family residence, neighborhood conservation, neighborhood plan (SF-3-NCCD-NP) combining district to single family residence – Historic Landmark – neighborhood conservation, neighborhood plan (SF-3-H-NCCD-NP) combining district zoning.

QUALIFICATIONS FOR LANDMARK DESIGNATION:

Architecture and Historical Associations. The house is an excellent example of a mid-1920s Craftsman bungalow and has long associations with Louis Goldberg, the business manager and later publisher of the American Statesman newspaper for many years, and a prominent member of Austin's Jewish community.

HISTORIC LANDMARK COMMISSION ACTION: Recommended the proposed zoning change from SF-3-NCCD-NP to SF-3-H-NCCD-NP for the property's significance in the areas of architecture and historical associations. Vote: 4-0 (Limbacher and Myers ill; Roberts absent).

PLANNING COMMISSION ACTION: Recommended the proposed zoning change from SF-3-NCCD-NP to SF-3-H-NCCD-NP for the property's significance in the areas of architecture and historical associations. Vote: 8-0 (Roark absent).

DEPARTMENT COMMENTS: The house is listed in the Comprehensive Cultural Resources Survey (1984) but without a priority for research.

BASIS FOR RECOMMENDATION:

Architecture:

One-story, wing-and-gable plan frame bungalow with a partial-width, shed-roofed independent porch on plain, square wood posts and an ornamental metal railing; single, paired, and triple 1:1 fenestration with decorative wood window screens.

Historical Associations:

The house was built in 1927 for Louis N. and Maude Goldberg, who moved in here from a house at 1507 Guadalupe Street. Born in Nacogdoches, Texas, Louis N. Goldberg was the son of Jewish immigrants from Germany, who moved from Nacogdoches to Lufkin while Louis was still a child, and had previously lived in Michigan. Louis' father, David Goldberg, is listed in early census as a merchant in Nacogdoches, and a restaurant keeper in Lufkin. By 1918, according to his World War I draft registration card, Louis was living in Beaumont, Texas, where he was the book-keeper for the Beaumont Journal Publishing Company, which published the local newspaper. The 1920 U.S. Census shows him living in a Beaumont boarding house and listed as a book-keeper for the newspaper. A 1922 listing of newspaper executives in Texas shows that Louis Goldberg was the general manager of the Beaumont Journal at that time. He then moved to Austin in 1923, and became the cashier of the Austin American, which had been purchased by Charles E. Marsh in 1919. Marsh and his partner, E.S. Fentress, bought the afternoon Austin paper, the Evening Statesman, in 1924, and Louis Goldberg became the auditor of the company that was established by Marsh and Fentress to run both the morning and afternoon papers. By 1927, at the time he purchased this property and had this house built, Goldberg was the business manager of the Austin newspapers, a position he held until becoming associate publisher, and finally publisher in the early 1950s. Goldberg was also a vice-president of Newspapers, Inc., which bought the Marsh interests in the American-Statesman in 1948. Newspapers, Inc. also owned the daily papers in Waco, Port Arthur, and Lufkin.

Besides his influential role at the American-Statesman, Louis Goldberg and his wife, Maude were also very active in a multitude of civic and cultural activities in the city. They were early members of Temple Beth Israel and served on various temple committees. Louis Goldberg was the president of the Austin Chamber of Commerce in the 1950s, and also served on the Lay Committee for St. Edward's.

BIOGRAPHICAL NOTES:

Louis N. and Maude Goldberg (ca. 1927 – ca. 1954)

Louis and Maude Goldberg appear in the 1940 U.S. Census as the owners of this house, which was worth \$5,000. Louis N. Goldberg was 48, had been born in Texas, and was the business manager for the newspaper. Maude Goldberg was 44, had been born in Louisiana, and had no occupation listed. They had a daughter, Regina Helene, 15, who had been born in Texas and had no occupation listed.. The Goldbergs also had a live-in servant, Hattie Mickon, 24. The 1930 U.S. Census shows the Goldbergs at this house with their daughter, Regina Helene. They had a boarder, Goldie Stern, 41, who had been born in Texas to Russian-born parents, and who worked as a stenographer for a lawyer; and a servant, Leona Roach, 16. Louis Goldberg was listed as the business manager for the newspaper. Louis Goldberg's World War I draft registration card shows that he was living in Beaumont, where he was the book-keeper for the Beaumont Journal Publishing Company. He had been born in Nacogdoches, Texas on February 28, 1892, and was single. He was of medium height and a slender build with brown eyes and black hair. The 1920 U.S. Census shows Lewis [sic] Goldberg living in a boarding house run by Arthur Chauncey in Beaumont. Louis Goldberg was a book-keeper for a newspaper. The 1910 U.S. Census shows Lewis as the 18-year old son of David and Rachel Goldberg, who lived in Lufkin, Texas. David Goldberg was a 49-year old German-born restaurant keeper. Rachel Goldberg was 44, had been born in Germany, and had no occupation listed. Lewis had no occupation listed. The family had apparently lived in Michigan at some point – their oldest daughter, Dollie, had been born there. The 1900 U.S. Census shows Lewis as the 8-year old son of David and Rachel Goldberg, who were living in Nacogdoches, Texas. This census report shows David Goldberg as having been born in Poland; he was a merchant.

Maude Goldberg died in 1954; Louis Goldberg remarried – his second wife's name was Annette. He retired from the newspaper in 1966 and died in Austin June 15, 1973.

Historical Narrative,

402 East 34th Street, Austin, TX 787 05

We believe our home is worthy of preservation and meets the criteria for nomination for a historic designation, as specified below.

The building itself is a Craftsman (Bungaloid) style home built in 1927, which retains many of its original features and characteristics. As such, it is a very fine example of classic 1920s architecture in a style which was very popular at the time and representative of architecture typical to Austin at that point in history. Pictures are enclosed.

The Craftsman as a distinctive building style became popular between 1905 to late 1920s and was primarily influenced by the work of architects Charles S and Henry M Greene of California (source: The Texas State Historical Association). It spread through pattern books and popular magazines and became one of the most popular designs for smaller houses.

The property has been pristinely maintained and its original characteristics and features preserved. As such, it contributes to the historic character and cultural identity of our neighborhood (and city) and, we believe, also adds artistic value.

Features typical of the Craftsman, beautifully present in the building, are a low pitch roof (side gabled), tall, narrow, grouped windows, (double hung) with original glass in many windows, and clapboard outside walls. The property retains its original structure, with one early addition on the back of the home (kitchen area) of unknown dating, but likely 1940s. A separate garage building has also been added, again date is unknown, but it is in keeping with the style and appearance of the main building and not visible from the street. Inside the house has its original long leaf pine floors, original French doors and original fireplace.

The house has a rich history in regards to its past occupants, and it has been a joy to research and learn about their lives and achievements. Most notably, the first owner of the home, residing here 1927-1955, was Louis Nathan Goldberg (1892-1973), former Publisher of the American Statesman. He lived here with his wife Maud.

Goldberg, a native of Nacogdoches, started as cashier of The American Statesman, became business manager in 1929 and Publisher in 1953. His service to The American Statesman has been described as "significant and lasting". Goldberg was also Vice President of Newspapers Inc., which operated Austin, Waco, Port Arthur and Lufkin newspapers. He retired as Publisher in 1966. He was a well known civic leader in Austin and also served as President for the Austin Chamber of Commerce, where his community development endeavors included the areas of agriculture, education, public health, highways and city planning. He was also on the Lay Board of St. Edward's University, serving as the

National Development Chairman for the school. In addition, he was an active member of many groups including Congregation Temple Beth Israel, the Austin Lodge No. 12 AF & AM, Scottish Rite Bodies, president of Ben Hur Shrine, the Rotary and a member of the Salvation Army advisory committee.

I have enclosed many news clippings for Goldberg that discusses his many interesting achievements. Quoting the Austin American Statesman, March 1, 1966:


"As an executive of the American Statesman, Goldberg has seen Austin grow from a small town to a city of national reputation, and the American Statesman from a correspondingly small daily to one of the state's major newspapers. Goldberg has been identified with many civic endeavors both as a newspaper executive and as a private citizen".

Goldberg passed away in June 1973 and is buried in Beth Israel Cemetery, which is inside Oakwood Cemetery and the oldest cemetery in the city of Austin. He had a daughter, Regina Goldberg Leon, who passed away in a car accident in 1974. Louis Goldberg was also survived by his second wife Annette Goldberg (an article featuring her is also enclosed), two stepdaughters, eight grandchildren, one great-grandchild and a niece.

"Divide and Conquer" would be an apropos slogan for Austin women, so successfully have they learned how to divide their time and energy in helping to conquer the widespread civic and welfare problems confronting their community.

With the coming of fall — the weatherman notwithstanding — most women put the "easier" living of summer behind them, and turned their sights toward the activity-filled months ahead. It would be simpler to find the proverbial needle in the haystack, than a woman who isn't involved in a half-dozen or more time-consuming projects. These projects range from F-TA and other activities that stem from having school age children in the family to the numerous organizations concerned with young or elderly people, to fund-raising benefits for various worthy projects.

Many women have been using

the summer months to lay foundations for some of these fall activities; among them, the women's participation in the 1961-62 United Fund drive that got off to an encouraging start Monday morning.

Mrs. Louis N. Goldberg, one of the vice chairmen of the UF's special gifts division, has been busy organizing the 20 women volunteers who would be working on the drive under her leadership; and, at the same time, she has been perusing innumerable cookbooks searching for French recipes.

The reason? Well she is not only publicity chairman for Temple Beth Israel Sisterhood, but also, food chairman for the annual fund-raising dance and cocktail party being sponsored by the sisterhood on Saturday, Oct. 21. Theme of the event this year, which is to be held at the Temple, is to depict Paris.

As a vice chairman of the UF special gifts project, she will be representing the YWCA, which is a UF agency. Both she and her co-chairman, Mrs. Rex Kitchens, are members of the YWCA board of directors; and she is chairman of its world fellowship committee. Mrs. Kitchens is a past president for two consecutive years. They have been busy working with Mrs. Vera Wilkes, executive director, on the YW's forthcoming annual World Fellowship event, a special benefit project at the YWCA to raise money, that will go to the national association for building a new YWCA in some other part of the world.

Mrs. Goldberg is also interested in, and devotes her time to, the United Cerebral Palsy Association of Texas, and is treasurer of the Capital Area of UCP.

Another of her volunteer services is the Auxiliary to Seton Hospital. She is co-chairman of the coffee shop at the hospital, which is sponsored by the auxiliary and staffed by its volunteers. She is also a Delphinian vice president.

However, Mrs. Goldberg considers her own biggest and most important job stems from her husband's "job," the nature of which is a great deal public relations. Being the wife of the publisher of The Austin American-Statesman Newspapers, involves her in the public relations facets of his position, also.

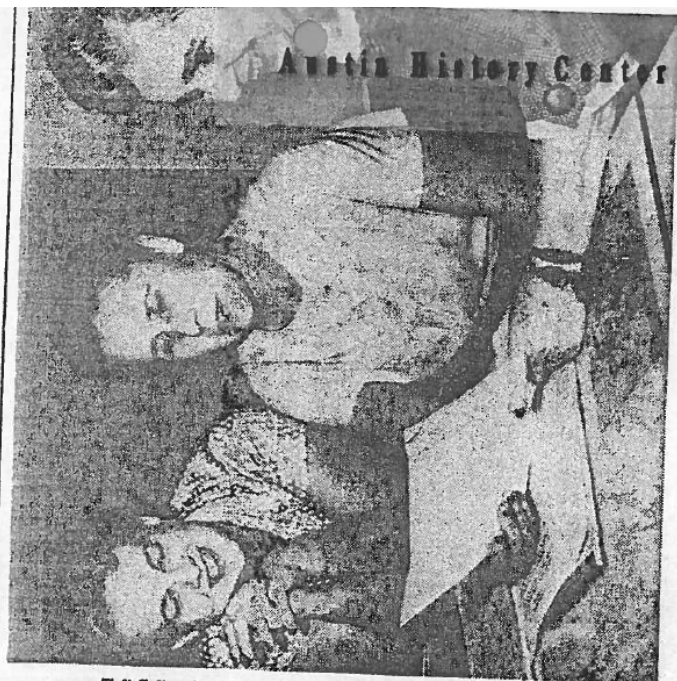

Goldberg's Services Set Today

Funeral for Louis Nathan Goldberg, former publisher of the American-Statesman and longtime Austin civic leader, will be at 4 p.m. Sunday at Cook-Walden Funeral Home. Rabbi Louis Firestein will officiate. Burial will be in Beth Israel Cemetery.

Goldberg died at 6:45 p.m. Friday in a local hospital.

Goldberg was known to many Austin friends as "Louie." He was past president of the Austin Chamber of Commerce, and throughout his business career headed many local civic groups and charity and community fund drives. He had been a Rotarian since 1937 holding a senior active membership in the Downtown Club. Goldberg also was a member for years of the Salvation Army Advisory Committee.

Goldberg retired Feb. 28, 1966. His career, which started as a cashier on the Enterprise in Beaumont when it was operated by the Marsh-Fentress organization, spanned 50 years.

He was a native of Nacogdoches.

After employment in Beaumont and Wichita Falls, Goldberg came to Austin as cashier of the American in 1923. The following year, when the American and Statesman merged under the present ownership, he became cashier of both newspapers.

Goldberg was named business manager of the American and Statesman in 1929 and became publisher in 1953. He also was a vice president of Newspapers Inc., which operates Austin, Waco, Port Arthur and Lufkin newspapers.

He was a 50-year member of Austin Lodge 12, AF and AM, and Scottish Rite Bodies. He also was president of Ben Hur Shrine, and a member of Congregation Temple Beth Israel, the Chamber of Commerce and formerly served on the Lay Board of St. Edward's University and was national development chairman for the school.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Annette Goldberg of Austin; daughter, Mrs. Adolph Leon of Lake Jackson; grandson, Richard Leon of Chevy Chase, Md.; stepdaughters, Mrs. James Simpson Jr. and Mrs. Ira Gershner of Pine Bluff, Ark., and Mrs. Leo Levi of McGee, Ark.; eight grandchildren; one great-grandchild; and a niece, Mrs. Ione Hirserberg of Chicago, Ill.

PUBLIC HEARING INFORMATION

This zoning/rezoning request will be reviewed and acted upon at two public hearings: before the Land Use Commission and the City Council. Although applicants and/or their agent(s) are expected to attend a public hearing, you are not required to attend. However, if you do attend, you have the opportunity to speak FOR or AGAINST the proposed development or change. You may also contact a neighborhood or environmental organization that has expressed an interest in an application affecting your neighborhood.

During its public hearing, the board or commission may postpone or continue an application's hearing to a later date, or may evaluate the City staff's recommendation and public input forwarding its own recommendation to the City Council. If the board or commission announces a specific date and time for a postponement or continuation that is not later than 60 days from the announcement, no further notice is required.

During its public hearing, the City Council may grant or deny a zoning request, or rezone the land to a less intensive zoning than requested but in no case will it grant a more intensive zoning.

However, in order to allow for mixed use development, the Council may add the MIXED USE (MU) COMBINING DISTRICT to certain commercial districts. The MU Combining District simply allows residential uses in addition to those uses already allowed in the seven commercial zoning districts. As a result, the MU Combining District allows the combination of office, retail, commercial, and residential uses within a single development.
