The Interlocal Agreement for the Road to Recovery Program between the City, Travis County, and the Austin Travis County Mental Health Mental Retardation Center (d.b.a Austin-Travis County Integral Care (ATCIC), formerly known as Austin/Travis County Mental Health Mental Retardation) originated in 2015. The City and ATCIC developed the Interlocal Agreement in order to provide integrated mental health and/or substance use disorder treatment utilizing evidence-based assessment and evidence-based cognitive treatment methodologies and transitional housing for homeless with criminal records.

The purpose of this approach is to better coordinate and standardize substance abuse treatment services for the community, to designate the target populations to be served, eligibility criteria, services to be covered, and expected outcomes according to those standards and requirements set forth in the Agreement. Under the Agreement, ATCIC provides specific services such as case management, train eligible clients in preparation for employment, identify and assist eligible clients with applying for and securing income support services, such as SSI, SSDI, food stamps, and train clients to complete housing applications, to include market rate, subsidized, transitional and permanent supportive housing.

ATCIC is the local authority for mental health with extensive experience in this area. In the model established under the Agreement, individuals are authorized and then served by organizations in the network that provide the assessment and treatment of eligible clients. In addition, the following MSO functions are provided: Credentialing, Gate Functions, Utilization Management, Quality Management, Management Information Systems, Financial Management, Administration/Contract Management, and Network Development and Management as set forth in the Agreement and specified by City.

DACC will amend this interlocal agreement with ATCIC to provide more intensive treatment for the target clients referred by DACC. This will authorize a maximum amount of \$543,427 for clients to reside in the Road to Recovery residential, recovery program and participate in the services, including individual treatment planning, psychotherapeutic and pharmacologic support services, rehabilitative skills training, case management, peer support services and services for individuals with co-occurring substance use and behavioral health disorders.
