## Additional Backup Information:

On December 8, 2016 the City Council adopted the Lamar Beach Metro Park Master Plan. The planning

process began in August 2015 and was completed in March 2016. Focus group meetings and three public workshops were conducted with numerous stakeholders, including Austin Independent School District (AISD), Austin High School, West Austin Youth Association (WAYA), APA, YMCA, and Old West Austin Neighborhood to receive feedback. The master plan process determined a mutually agreed location for an animal services center. The proposed location for the animal services center will result in a more efficient use of parkland. The approved master plan will serve as a guide for the future development of Lamar Beach to maximize its benefit for the general public and the organizations that rely on the park. The new license agreement will require APA to fundraise and construct a new facility within a specified period of time within the proposed future boundary. Additionally, the license agreement will state that after the first 25 year term, City approval will be needed to extend each of the following two (2) additional 25-year options.
