1	RESOLUTION NO.
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3	WHEREAS, the City is committed to the safety, health, and welfare of all
4	of its residents; and
5	WHEREAS, ensuring the safety of Austin residents, public safety officers,
6	and visitors is a top City priority; and
7	WHEREAS, the United States Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
8	reports that gun violence in the United States is at epidemic levels, claiming over
9	30,000 lives annually; and
10	WHEREAS, according to the National Law Enforcement Officers
11	Memorial Fund, in 2011, firearms were the number one cause of death for police
12	officers killed in the line of duty; and
13	WHEREAS, in the first week of the 116th Congress, House Resolution 8
14	(H.R. 8) was introduced on a bipartisan basis in the United States House of
15	Representatives to require background checks for all commercial gun sales; and
16	WHEREAS, on February 27, 2019, the United States House of
17	Representatives, on a bipartisan basis, approved H.R. 8, marking the first time
18	major gun safety legislation has passed the United States House of Representatives
19	in more than twenty years; and
20	WHEREAS, in the over 150 days since H.R. 8 was passed by the United
21	States House of Representatives, the United States Senate has not debated or voted
22	on this important legislation; and

23	WHEREAS, the United States Congress is currently on a five-week August
24	recess and will not be considering legislation during that time; and
25	WHEREAS, in just the first weekend of August, at least 29 people were
26	killed in mass acts of gun violence in 24 hours, and on average, 100 Americans
27	will be shot and killed every day the Senate does not act; and
28	WHEREAS, on August 3, 2019, one of those mass acts of gun violence
29	occurred in El Paso, Texas where 20 individuals are reported to have been killed
30	by a shooter who, according to initial reports, uploaded an online manifesto
31	describing a so-called "Hispanic invasion of Texas" and referencing inspiration
32	from the attack on mosques in Christchurch, New Zealand that left 51 dead; and
33	WHEREAS, federal authorities have reported that they are investigating the
34	El Paso mass shooting as a potential hate crime and as a potential act of domestic
35	terrorism; and
36	WHEREAS, the wounded in El Paso ranged in age from two years old to 82
37	years old and the initial reporting indicates that an assault-style rifle similar to an
38	AK-47 was secured at the scene; and
39	WHEREAS, after the May 18, 2018 shooting at Santa Fe High School, in
40	Santa Fe, Texas, where 10 people were killed and 13 injured, Texas Governor
41	Greg Abbott met with superintendents, administrators, law enforcement officials,
42	as well as survivors of gun violence, to discuss policies that could increase the
43	safety of schools and communities while preserving Second Amendment rights;
44	and
45	WHEREAS, on May 30, 2018 Texas Governor Greg Abbott released a
46	School and Firearm Safety Action Plan, which included a recommendation

47	encouraging the Texas Senate and House leaders to consider the merits of adopting
48	a red flag law or "extreme risk protective orders" allowing law enforcement, a
49	family member, a school employee, or a district attorney to file a petition seeking
50	the removal of firearms from a potentially dangerous person only after legal due
51	process is provided; and
52	WHEREAS, Texas Governor Greg Abbott's School and Firearm Safety
53	Action Plan described the so called "red flag laws" as a proposal which could have
54	been used to prevent the shootings at Sutherland Springs and at Marjory Stoneman
55	Douglas High School in Parkland, Florida; and
56	WHEREAS, the 86th Legislative Session began January 8, 2019 and
57	provided opportunities for the Texas House and Senate to consider important gun
58	safety legislation; and
59	WHEREAS, on average over 3,350 gun-related deaths occur in Texas each
60	year; and
61	WHEREAS, local organizations, including Texas Gun Sense and local
62	chapters of Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense in America, have advocated at
63	the Texas Legislature for sensible gun safety legislation; and
64	WHEREAS, the Texas Legislature adjourned without taking sufficient
65	action to reduce the risk of gun violence in our schools and communities; and
66	WHEREAS, Texas Governor Greg Abbott has the authority to call a special
67	session of the Texas Legislature to immediately address meaningful action to
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69	prevent tragedies, such as the mass shooting in El Paso from happening in other Texas communities; and

70	WHEREAS, City Council has taken extensive action to address the
71	epidemic of gun violence including Resolution No. 20130228-035 signifying City
72	Council's intent to endorse efforts to develop a comprehensive approach to
73	reducing gun crime as well as Resolution Nos. 20161215-064, 20171207-054, and
74	20180510-047;
75	NOW, THEREFORE,
76	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:
77	City Council implores the state and federal governments to immediately take
78	emergency action to end gun violence and address the associated public health and
79	public safety crisis; and
80	BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED:
81	City Council calls on Texas Governor Greg Abbott to immediately call a
82	special session of the Texas Legislature to advance proposals included in Governor
83	Abbott's own School and Firearm Safety Action Plan; and
84	BE IT FURTHER RESOVLED:
85	City Council calls on the United States Senate to immediately return from
86	recess and begin debate and deliberation on H.R. 8 and other meaningful gun
87	safety legislation that has been approved by the United States House of
88	Representatives and remains languishing in the Senate; and
89	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:
90	City Council directs the City Manager to send a copy of this Resolution to
91	the Texas delegation of the United States Congress and to the White House; and
92	BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

93	City Council directs the City Manager to send a copy of Governor Abbott	's
94	School and Firearm Safety Action Plan along with a copy of this Resolution to the	he
95	Travis, Williamson and Hays County delegation of the Texas House and Senate,	,
96	the Texas Governor, the Texas Lieutenant Governor, and to the Speaker of the	
97	Texas House of Representatives; and
