### City Council Resolution 20200507-060

- ✓ Maximize effectiveness of federal relief funds
- ✓ Minimize impact on FY20 budget
- ✓ Include a timeline for expenditures that aligns with the requirements of each funding source
- ✓ Include all previously approved Council funding initiatives
- ✓ Allow for flexibility in use of funds including a contingency category
- ✓ Prioritize programs that address the public health crisis and save lives
- ✓ Prioritize restricted-use federal relief funds to serve vulnerable populations

- May sales tax payment down 4.5% from the prior year (2 month lag; represents March sales)
- Other large Texas cities experienced steeper declines ranging from 6.5% to 10.7%; State down 9.3%

# Projected Revenue Shortfalls by Source

### Other Funds – FY20 Projections

- Hotel Occupancy Taxes \$36.7 million decline
  - Impact on programs in the Convention Center, Historic Preservation, Cultural Arts, and Music Funds
- Airport Revenue \$68.1 million decline
  - Steep declines in parking fees, landing fees, and concession revenue
- Austin Transportation Department Parking Fees \$8.9 million decline



# Federal Funding Sources

# Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)

### Federal Cost Share 75%; Local Cost Share 25%

- Examples of Eligible Expenses
  - Emergency operations center, event-specific training, and technical assistance
  - Disinfection of public facilities
  - Medically necessary testing and diagnosis
  - Emergency medical treatment and transportation of COVID-19 patients
  - Purchase of food, water, ice, and medicine
  - Purchase of personal protective equipment and medical equipment
  - Temporary medical and quarantine facilities
  - Security and law enforcement
  - Communications of general health and safety information to the public

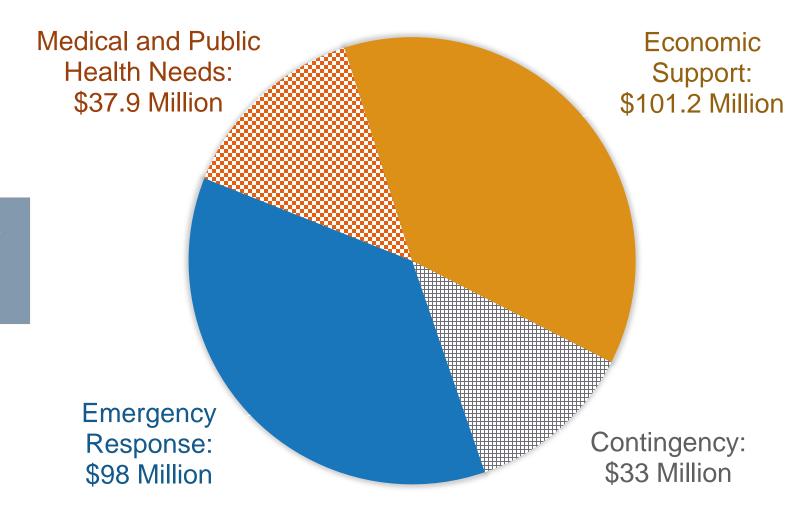


# Coronavirus Spending Framework

### **Key Principles**

- ✓ Medical and public health response is our top priority
  - Testing, contact tracing, and protection of vulnerable populations
- ✓ All public health and economic support programs must lead with racial equity
  - Latinx and African Americans are experiencing disproportionate health impacts
  - Asian Americans are experiencing disproportionate business impacts
- ✓ Preserve the City's long-term fiscal health
  - Adhere to financial policies by being judicious in use of reserves
  - Goal is to maintain 12% reserve level for both FY20 and FY 21
- ✓ Framework must be adaptable to changing conditions

- COVID-19 Emergency Management (Emergency Operations Center; direct response to pandemic; operational and programmatic adjustments necessary for responding to the COVID-19 pandemic)

Contingency: \$33 Million

### **Programs**

- Additional medical or public health needs
- Higher than anticipated operational expenses related to COVID-19 response
- Ability to pay for expenditures disallowed by federal funding sources
- Flexibility to adapt to changing conditions

### **Timing Considerations**

- Coronavirus Relief Fund expenditures must be incurred between March 1, 2020 and December 30, 2020
- The City has from March 25, 2020 (the date of the Texas disaster declaration) until September 21, 2020 to incur costs eligible for FEMA reimbursement
- Program spending phased over allowable timeframes to meet both current and future community needs
