RESOLUTION NO.

2	WHEREAS, the City Council of Austin is committed to defending		
3	democratic institutions, the integrity of our elections, and both the security of		
4	people who carry out the democratic process and the facilities in which the work		
5	of our democracy is conducted; and		
6	WHEREAS, the City Council of Austin is committed to ending the		
7	spread of hate, bigotry, and harassment based on race, color, religion, national		
8	origin, ethnicity, sex, gender, gender identity and expression, sexual orientation,		
9	disability, or any other protected characteristic as defined by law; and		
10	WHEREAS, the City Council of Austin wishes to affirm its commitment		
11	to the well-being and safety of all of its community members and to ensure that		
12	they will be protected and their rights respected; and		
13	WHEREAS, the City Council of Austin wishes to affirm its		
14	commitment to cultivating an inclusive community, including within Austin		
15	operations and institutions; and		
16	WHEREAS, the diversity of our community is beneficial to all within it,		
17	making us stronger and more resilient; and		
18	WHEREAS, each of our elected leaders has the ability and obligation to		
19	promote inclusiveness; celebrate diversity; work to ensure equitable opportunities		
20	in all major facets of society; prevent the spread of misinformation and		
21	disinformation; and reject hate and bias in all forms and should set a positive		
22	example for their constituents in this regard; and		

23	WHEREAS, the January 6, 2021 domestic terrorism incident at our		
24	nation's Capitol does not reflect the values of Austin; and		
25	WHEREAS, ADL's (the Anti-Defamation League) report on Murder		
26	and Extremism in the United States in 2019 found that domestic extremists		
27	killed at least 42 people in the United States in 17 separate incidents in 2019,		
28	making 2019 the sixth deadliest year on record for domestic extremist-related		
29	killings since 1970; and		
30	WHEREAS, the ADL report found that the extremist-related murders of		
31	2019 were overwhelmingly (90%) linked to right-wing extremists, with all but		
32	one of the incidents tied to right-wing extremism, and 81% of extremist-related		
33	murders in 2019 committed by white supremacists specifically; and		
34	WHEREAS, disinformation, misinformation, and online conspiracy		
35	theories such as QAnon are spreading and inspiring real-world violence; and		
36	WHEREAS, the City Council of Austin supports the peaceful exercise of		
37	free speech, free assembly, and freedom to worship safely for all people; and		
38	NOW THEREFORE,		
39	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:		
40	1. The City Council of Austin affirms its ongoing commitment to cultivating		
41	an inclusive, safe, and just society and culture that values the diversity of		
42	our community, works to ensure equitable opportunities in all major facets		
43	of society, and celebrates both our individuality and commonality.		
44	2. The City Council of Austin denounces the January 6, 2021 domestic		
45	terrorism incident at our nation's Capitol.		

- 3. The City Council of Austin denounces anti-government extremism, white supremacy, racism, antisemitism, misogyny, Islamophobia, anti-LGBTQ+ hate, ableism, ageism and all hateful speech and bias-motivated violent actions in our community.
 - 4. The City Council of Austin denounces extremist conspiracy theories, misinformation, and disinformation that cultivate an alienated and mistrustful electorate, undermine democratic institutions and processes, and increase the likelihood of violence.
 - 5. The City Council of Austin denounces attempts to exploit governmental procedure and basic government functions for personal political gain.
 - 6. The City Council of Austin commits to fostering an environment within Austin operations and institutions that does not tolerate anti-government extremist, white supremacist, racist, antisemitic, misogynist, Islamophobic, anti-LGBTQ+, ableist, and other hateful speech and actions.
 - 7. The City Council of Austin commits to countering hate and extremism through engagement with community leaders, governmental transparency and public information-sharing regarding efforts to fight extremism, and the investigation and prosecution of those who commit criminal acts, consistent with civil liberties protections.
