1	RESOLUTION NO
2	WHEREAS, the City of Austin was founded in 1839, and in the same year
4	the City also established a 40-acre plot as City Cemetery, a municipally owned
5	burial ground; and
6	WHEREAS, City Cemetery, renamed Oakwood Cemetery in 1907, is the
7	final resting place for many of the early and prominent families of Austin; and
8	WHEREAS, due to the racist custom of cemetery segregation prevailing at
9	the time, Oakwood had "colored grounds" which were in a separate and undivided
10	area, and Mexicans and paupers were buried along the fence line, usually in
11	unmarked graves; and
12	WHEREAS, Oakwood cemetery filled quickly, and in 1914 the Oakwood
13	Annex was established with an additional 18 acres of burial sites, but did not
14	include a "colored" section, and burials were denied to African Americans; and
15	WHEREAS, in 1893, in response to the need for a dignified burial ground,
16	members of the East Austin community, including John M. Holland, William M.
17	Tears, Henderson Rollins and Allen Bradley, formed the Bethany Cemetery
18	Company and established Austin's first Black cemetery on 6.18 acres on the 1300
19	block of Springdale Road; and
20	WHEREAS, in 1933, the last of the officers of the original Bethany
21	Cemetery Company passed away, and the entity ceased to function; and
22	WHEREAS, in 1971, the Bethany Cemetery Association was formed, and
23	in 1976, Eva Ross, Carl Wilson and Willie R. Conley, representatives of Bethany
24	Cemetery Association, filed a lawsuit in the Travis County District Court for
25	possession of Bethany Cemetery; and

26	WHEREAS, on April 27, 1976, the court ruled in favor of the plaintiffs,
27	Eva Ross, Carl Wilson, and Willie R. Conley, and the 6.18 acres known as
28	Bethany Cemetery were legally transferred to the Bethany Cemetery Association;
29	and
30	WHEREAS, in 2003, Bethany Cemetery was designated a Texas Historic
31	Landmark for its significance in the development of Austin's African American
32	community; and
33	WHEREAS, all members of the Bethany Cemetery Association, including
34	its founder, Eva Ross, passed away, and the land entered into neglect; and
35	WHEREAS, the Bethany Cemetery Association was involuntarily dissolved
36	by the Secretary of State in 1994; and
37	WHEREAS, residents in proximity to the cemetery have called on the City
38	to address the deteriorating conditions of Bethany Cemetery; and
39	WHEREAS, State law does not authorize municipalities to use public funds
40	on abandoned or unkept cemeteries within a city's jurisdiction; and
41	WHEREAS, the ability for private entities to contribute to improvements is
42	hindered by the abandoned status of Bethany Cemetery; and
43	WHEREAS, Texas Health and Safety Code (Code) § 713.009 provides that
44	a municipality may take possession and control of a cemetery on behalf of the
45	public if the cemetery threatens or endangers public health, safety, comfort or
46	welfare; and
47	WHEREAS, Council finds that the neglected and deteriorated condition of
48	Bethany Cemetery threatens public health and safety; and

49	WHEREAS, Resolution No. 20140612-075 directed the City Manager to
50	explore a transition of maintenance responsibility and ownership of Bethany
51	Cemetery to the City of Austin; and
52	WHEREAS, a July 11, 2014 memorandum prepared in response to
53	Resolution No. 20140612-075 identified expenditures of \$82,924 in one-time
54	capital expenses, \$35,137 in ongoing annual maintenance expenses to bring
55	Bethany Cemetery up to City maintenance standards, and a one-time expense of
56	\$28,324 to include Bethany Cemetery in the City's Historic Cemeteries Master
57	Plan; and
58	WHEREAS, consistent maintenance and the preservation of Bethany
59	Cemetery honor its significance as a piece of Austin's African American
60	community and history and ensure the public health, safety, comfort, and welfare
61	of the community; and
62	WHEREAS, the proximity of Bethany Cemetery to City-owned cemeteries
63	and parks presents opportunities to create additional connectivity among East
64	Austin's open spaces; and
65	WHEREAS, the City of Austin reaffirms that circumstances of Bethany
66	Cemetery are unique and represent a historical divide in the community that seeks
67	to be mended; NOW THEREFORE,
68	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF AUSTIN:
69	Council directs the City Manager to initiate transfer of ownership of Bethany
70	Cemetery to the City of Austin in accordance with Texas Health and Safety Code §
71	713.009 and upon completion of the transfer of ownership, to update the City's
72	Historic Cemeteries Master Plan to include Bethany Cemetery.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

Council directs the City Manager to provide notice of the City's intent to take possession and control of Bethany Cemetery in accordance with the notice requirements of Code § 713.009(e).

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

- The Council directs the City Manager to, no later than 60 days after providing notice of the City's intent to take possession and control of Bethany Cemetery, present a plan to Council to:
 - (1) remove or repair any fences, walls, or other improvements;
 - (2) straighten and reset any memorial stones or embellishments that are a threat or danger to public health, safety, comfort, or welfare; and
 - (3) take proper steps to restore and maintain the premises in an orderly and decent condition.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED:

Council directs the City Manager to identify funding in the FY2021-22 budget for the transition of maintenance responsibility and ownership of Bethany Cemetery to the City of Austin and for the inclusion of Bethany Cemetery in the City's Historic Cemeteries Master Plan.
