

TEXAS COMPASSIONATE USE PROGRAM: BACKGROUND



- The Texas Compassionate Use Act enacted by the Texas Legislature in 2015.
- The Department of Public Safety (DPS) administers the Compassionate Use Program (CUP) in Texas. DPS operates a secure online registry of physicians who can prescribe low-tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) to patients and manages the licensing of organizations that dispense low-THC cannabis
- As of August 2021:
 - 408 physicians approved by DPS to prescribe low-THC cannabis
 - 8,212 patients listed by their physicians in Compassionate Use Registry*

HOUSE BILL 1535: LEGISLATIVE INFORMATION



- Authored by Representative Stephanie Klick, Effective September 1, 2021
- Expands medical conditions for which low-THC can be prescribed to include:
 - Post-traumatic stress disorder
 - All forms of cancer (previously only terminal cancer)
 - Medical conditions approved as part of a research program
- Increases maximum THC level of low-THC cannabis from 0.5 % to 1% by weight
- Establishes compassionate-use institutional review boards to evaluate and approve proposed research programs to study the medical use of low THC cannabis. Bill also sets out qualifications for a physician to prescribe low-THC cannabis as part of an approved research program.

HB 1535: REGULATORY INFORMATION



Dept. of State Health Services

- Proposed Rule 25 TAC §1.65
 establishing compassionateuse institutional review
 board (CIRB)
- Comments due September 20

Dept. of Public Safety

- DPS required to adopt or amend rules regarding cultivation, processing, & dispensing of low-THC cannabis by licensed dispensing organizations no later than December 1, 2021
- Proposed Rules have not yet been posted
