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SUBJECT: Authorize execution of a 12-month supply agreement with STRYKER EMS, Kalamazoo, MI, for ambulance stretchers, stair chairs, accessories, and repair parts for the Emergency Medical Services Department in an amount not to exceed \$77,250, with two 12-month extension options in amounts not to exceed \$107,995 for the first extension option and \$145,960 for the second extension option, for a total agreement amount not to exceed \$331,205.

AMOUNT & SOURCE OF FUNDING: Funding in the amount of \$72,233 is available in the Fiscal Year 2004-2005 Approved Operating Budget for the Emergency Medical Services Department for ambulance stretchers, stair chairs, accessories and repair parts. Funding for the remaining four months of the original contract period for the repair parts portion and the extension options is contingent upon available funding in future budgets.

FISCAL NOTE: There is no unanticipated fiscal impact. A fiscal note is not required.

PURCHASING: Lowest bid of two bids received.

MBE / WBE: This contract will be awarded in compliance with Chapter 2-9 of the City Code (Minority-Owned and Women-Owned Business Enterprise Procurement Program). No subcontracting opportunities were identified; therefore, no goals were established for this solicitation.

This contract will provide stretchers, stair chairs, accessories, and repair parts for the Emergency Medical Services Department (EMS). Each ambulance in the EMS system is equipped with a stretcher and stair chair for patient packaging and transport.

Stretchers are mobile beds that EMS patients are secured to during transportation to the medical facility. Upon arrival at the hospital, the patient is then moved, via the stretcher, from the ambulance into the hospital emergency room. Stair chairs offer another type of patient transportation. When patients are located in areas where stretcher transport to the ambulance is not safe or feasible, (upper floors of an apartment complex, extremely narrow and winding hallways) the patient will be secured in the stair chair. The patient may then be easily and safely evacuated down flights of stairs or through the narrow hallways to the location of the stretcher. The patients will then be moved from the stair chair to the stretcher and transported to the hospital.


Ten stretchers and nine stair chairs were approved in this year's budget as replacements for existing units. For the extension options, it is estimated that 15 stretchers and stair chairs will be required for scheduled replacement and for new ambulances in the first extension year and 20 of each will be required in the second extension year. Due to the EMS system's high emergency call volume and use, and
