Creative Reset Phase II — Community FAQ

1. What is the Creative Reset?

The Creative Reset is a citywide effort led by Austin Arts, Culture, Music, and Entertainment (AACME) to reimagine how Austin invests in and supports arts, culture, and heritage. It's part of AACME's 12–18-month strategic planning process to create a more accessible, inclusive, and sustainable creative ecosystem for the future.

2. What is Phase II about?

Phase II focuses on listening to the community to better understand how our arts and cultural centers and museums can serve Austin today and, in the years ahead. Through historical data/ and surveys, community meetings, and open dialogue, we're gathering feedback that will guide future programs, facilities, and investments.

3. How does this connect to AACME's strategic plan?

Community input gathered during Phase II will directly inform AACME's strategic plan, helping City leadership identify priorities, allocate resources, and ensure that future programs, staffing, and budget requests reflect what the community values most.

4. What did Phase I accomplish?

Phase I focused on improving Austin's cultural funding programs—making them more transparent, accessible, and responsive to community needs. Those programs are now open for application and being implemented. Phase II builds on that success by evaluating facilities and programs.

5. Why is community feedback so important?

Austin's creative community is diverse and dynamic. Your feedback ensures that the City's arts, culture, and heritage spaces represent the point of view, stories, and needs of all Austinites. The information we collect will guide decisions about programming, maintenance, accessibility, and future investment.
