KNOW THE FACTS ABOUT HUMAN PAPILLOMAVIRUS

Human Papillomavirus (HPV) is the most common sexually transmitted infection. There are many types that can cause health problems, including certain types of cancer and genital warts.

Signs

- HPV does not usually show symptoms
- Some people may get painful bumps or warts on or around their genitals



Spread

- Having vaginal, anal, or oral sex, or close skin-skin touching during sex with someone who has the virus
- Mother-to-baby by pregnancy, labor or nursing if the mother has the virus even if she is showing no symptoms
- A person with HPV can still infect others even if they are showing no signs or symptoms

Vaccine

- The first dose is routinely recommended for ages 11-12.
- If you start before age 15, only 2 doses are needed instead of 3
- People ages 26+ can decide with their doctor whether to get vaccinated
- Vaccine side effects often go away within 2 days and are usually mild.

Facts

- There are over 100 types of HPV, and 14 of them cause a high-risk of cancer which may form in the vulva, vagina, penis, anus or mouth.
- 60% of the cancers that develop are in the mouth, tongue, or throat.
- Symptoms can develop years after having sex with someone who has the infection, so it is difficult to know when you first got it.
