LETTER FROM THE DIRECTOR

In the ever-changing world of animal welfare, the past year presented both challenges and opportunities for the staff of the Animal Services Office (ASO). It is my honor to work with the dedicated ASO team who have shown flexibility, resilience, and commitment to our goals every year.

The Animal Services Office provides sheltering, enforcement and prevention services for the City of Austin and unincorporated areas of Travis County. In partnership with community organizations, ASO staff provide a safety net to our most vulnerable pet populations and remain dedicated to sustaining Austin's No-Kill commitment of achieving live outcomes for 95% of the companion animals that enter the shelter each year.



Our top priorities: helping animals most at-risk, supporting pet owners through education and resources, and expediting the placement of sheltered animals into adoptive homes or one of our rescue partners. A prevention-based, educational approach is used throughout all of ASO's programming and activities in an effort to keep pets in their own homes and reduce shelter intake. This past year also brought about a renewed focus on public safety.

In 2023, intakes exceeded our outcomes and we faced overcrowding issues at every level, from intake to daily maintenance to positive outcomes. Staff and volunteers were required to go above and beyond in caring for all the animal companions in our care. Yet, the live outcome rate for 2023 was 97.2%!

Staff also received the assessment conducted by the City Auditors and have worked hard at meeting the identified challenges. Our volunteers stepped up and provided the most volunteer hours recorded in ASO's history.

With continued focus on refining policies and procedures, ensuring appropriate staffing levels, and strengthening community support, the Animal Services Office will continue to enhance its reputation as one of the most progressive and humane animal welfare communities in the nation.

The City of Austin Animal Services Office (ASO) operates Austin Animal Center (AAC), our campus on Levander Loop in East Austin. Austin Animal Center has been proudly no-kill since 2011, exceeding the national no-kill standard of 90% live release rate every year. In 2019, City Council recognized the high level of lifesaving and officially mandated a live release rate of at least 95%. Austin Animal Center also plays a crucial role in the community by promoting responsible pet ownership and connecting community members with resources for their pets. 



NEIGHBORHOOD LEVEL PROGRAM

The Neighborhood Level Program (NLP) works to connect pet owners with resources to help them care for their pet. NLP staffer Brendan has focused on building trust and connection with people and pets experiencing homelessness. These folks and their pets do not fit into our typical animal services model due to their unique barriers, so Brendan hits the road to meet them where they're at.

- Brendan was invited to join the citywide Homelessness Encampment Management and Logistics team.
- Costco, Amazon, and Tomlinson's provided large donations of pet food and supplies.
- We handed out supplies and resources at monthly Pop Up Resource Clinics alongside EMS, CapMetro, Addiction Services, and others.

COMMUNITY CATS



Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) is the most humane and effective cat population tool available to communities. Free-roaming cats are trapped by Community Cats volunteers and sent through spay/neuter surgery with our partner Austin Humane Society. Shelter-Neuter-Return (SNR) is a version of TNR for found cats that come to the shelter through Good Samaritans; staff evaluate each cat to determine the best outcome.

Community Cats is much more than "just" TNR and SNR. We also provide medical vouchers for caretakers to seek veterinary care for free-roaming cats.

CACTUS CATS

Designed to help shy or tempermental cats find homes, we define Cactus Cats like the plant they're named for: unique, beautiful, low maintenance, and perhaps a little prickly.

Cactus Cats have their own cactus-themed group room at the shelter and a set of dedicated staff and volunteers to help work on their people skills and find adopters who accept each Cactus Cat just the way they are.
