

## **Bolm District Park Vision Plan**

**Community Engagement Round 3: Vision Plan Engagement and Input Summary** 

July 18, 2024

#### **About the Project**

The City of Austin, Parks and Recreation Department (PARD) has engaged Halff Associates to provide vision planning and design services for Bolm District Park, an undeveloped district park of approximately 68.1 acres, located along the Colorado River at 6700 Bolm Road. The primary goal of the planning project is to develop a visionary framework to guide the future development of the park, its programming, facilities, features, general layout, funding requirements and potential implementation strategy through a study of PARD goals, site and area context analysis and a robust public engagement process. Community engagement includes three touchpoints, or rounds of engagement, including the introduction of the project, Vision Plan design concept options, and the recommended Vision Plan. Results from this effort shall be used as a roadmap for the future park development, park programming, business operations and management. The Vision Plan will also be used as a promotional tool to generate public interest, support and funding for future parkland development and partnerships.

#### **Engagement Approach and Details**

Round #3 of community engagement efforts began in April 2024. The outreach team built on past outreach efforts to raise awareness and encourage engagement in Round #3 input opportunities. Four weeks prior to the meeting, a final event postcard was sent via Every Door Direct Mail to approximately 15,000 residents living within a two-mile area of Bolm Park. Multiple email notifications were sent to the stakeholder database, as well as social media posts and updates to the project webpage. Yard signs promoting the project were placed at Latinapalooza event, Montopolis Recreation Center and the George Washington Carver Museum and Library. Project outreach materials included information in English and Spanish, as well as a QR code and link for the project webpage, which included project details and meeting registration links.

A virtual Community Meeting was held via Zoom on May 14, 2024. The meeting was open to all and was conducted in both English and Spanish. The objectives of the meeting were to:

- inform the community about the project process and engagement efforts;
- share feedback gathered from the community during Rounds 2;
- present the final draft conceptual plan for the park;
- encourage participation in the Round 3 online survey; and
- share information about next steps.

During the meeting, the project team shared details about the project, Round #2 public input, provided information about the Sustainable SITES Initiative Certification and presented the draft final conceptual plan. Participants had the opportunity to provide comments and questions via the chat feature and the project team addressed questions. Participants were provided the online survey link and were encouraged to complete the survey and share it with

others in the community. Presentation materials and the meeting recording were made available for viewing on the project website at: www.austintexas.gov/bolmpark

The Round #3 project survey was launched on May 14, 2024 and closed on June 24, 2024. It included five questions which gathered feedback respondent's proximity to the park, their zip code, how well the draft final concept plan achieves community values, what people like best about the concept, and any additional comments or questions. Additionally, participants had the opportunity to respond to demographic questions to help identify whether outreach efforts were connecting effectively with the diverse community. Feedback from the survey is included in the "survey responses" section.

In addition to the online engagement opportunities, three Pop-Up events were conducted at various locations in the community. These events served as an opportunity to engage residents in an informal way and provide project information, paper surveys in English and Spanish, and links to the online survey. Events ranged from one to two hours and included a Spanish Speaking team member.

#### **Input Summary**

The survey for Community Engagement Round #3 asked respondents to provide feedback on the draft final concept plan. The concept plan was described in depth, showing planned locations for roadways and parking, trails and pathways, and areas for passive play, active play and nature interaction. Planned amenities include items such as sports courts, bike park, trails, plaza/pavilion, playground, restroom, nature trails, personal water sports access and more.

Survey respondents were asked to rate how well the concept plan achieves the community values established for the project. They were also asked to rank the top five things they like best about the draft final concept plan. Respondents also were given an open comment area to share any additional comments or questions regarding the draft final concept plan.

#### **Survey Responses**

The online survey received 1,988 views, had 751 participants, and 292 comments to the open ended questions. The tables below represent the input received from all respondents to the survey. The project website provides a link to the report of comments received to the open comment question.




