


The (1985) MUNICIPAL CODE: Chapter 7-2 LIBRARIES AND CULTURAL ACTIVITIES:

Except as otherwise provided in this section, the council shall appropriate an amount equal to at least two-percent of the construction costs of a project to select, acquire, and display art.

Magic Portal by James Edward Talbot




Materials: Ferrocement, steel, ceramics, embedded donated mementos




WIBE 2025 AIPP turns 40

Planning for 2025


- Community engagement over the next 15 months (dialogue to many voices)
