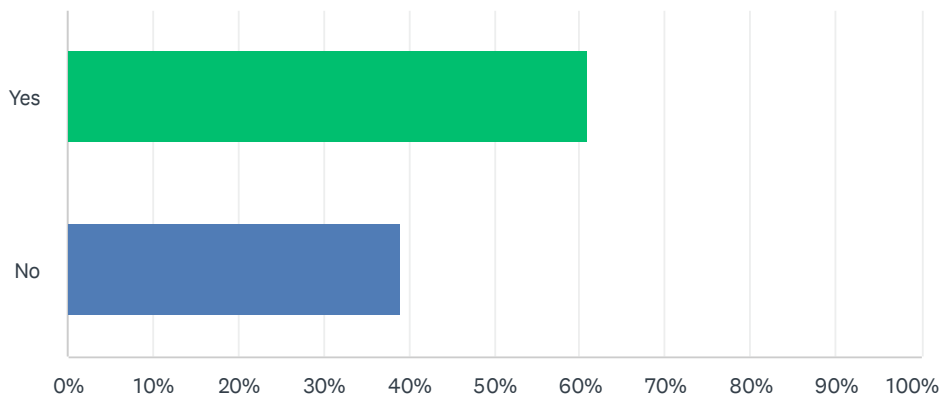


Q1 Do you have a loved one currently interred in Austin Memorial Park or have you purchased/inherited a space in Austin Memorial Park?

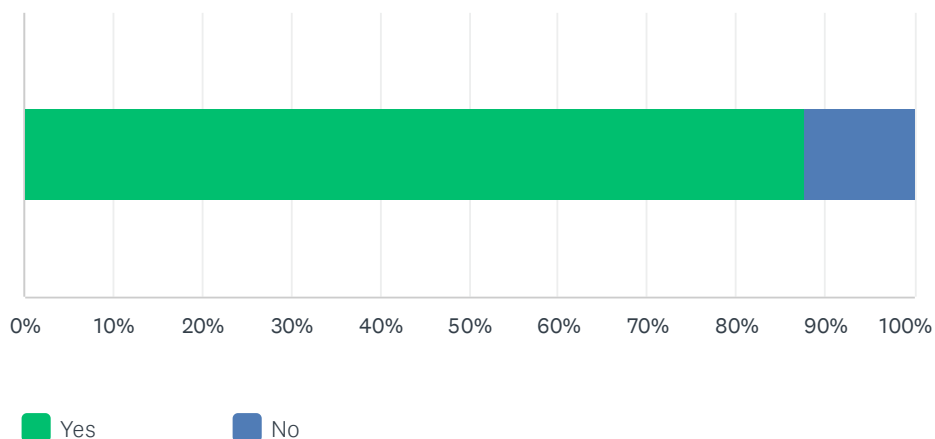

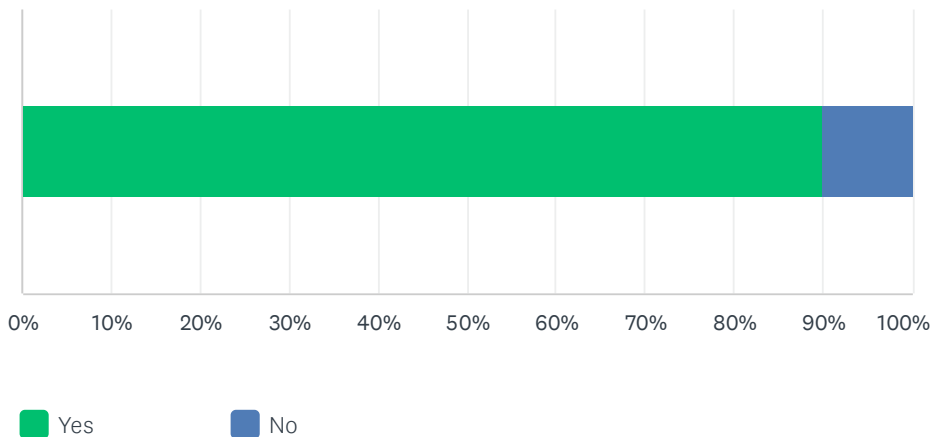

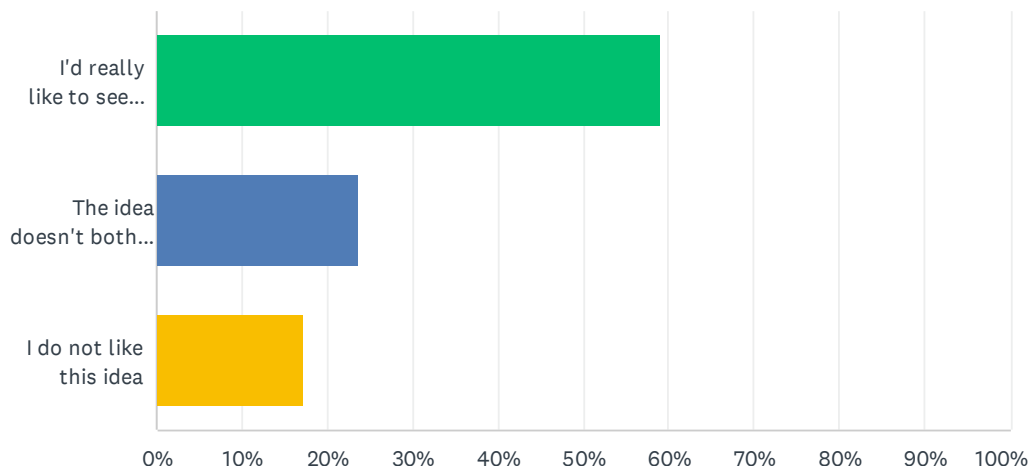
