





CCID: Background & Purpose

The City of Austin is exploring the creation of a Cultural and Climate Innovation District (CCID) for the South Shore/Barton Springs area including Butler Shores and surrounding South Austin cultural assets.

The goal for the proposed District is to leverage the cultural and park/ecological assets to coordinate activities, educate and entertain visitors, advance climate change resilience, and protect and preserve the district's assets.

RESOLUTION NO. 20210520-062

WHEREAS, the 1984 Town Lake Comprehensive Plan Lake Corridor Study were initial efforts by the City to begin to parkland and useful recreation space through selective land acq initiating the opportunity to create an active new "living room"

WHEREAS, those efforts began the work to locate futt and performance venues and outlined zoning overlays to guid both sides of the lake; and

WHEREAS, the guidance provided by these plans has subsequent discussions over the years concerning parkland, development and other associated topics; and

WHEREAS, many great cities have found a compati institutions such as museums, galleries, theaters, and conce graciousness of a natural park setting; and

WHEREAS, the natural environment and how we preserve it is at least as valuable a measure of our cultura our built environment; and

SUBJECT:

Resolution No. 20210520-062 – City Cultural and Climate Innovation District

This memo serves as an update related to <u>Resolution No. 20210520-062</u> directing the Parks and Recreation Department (Department) to work with appropriate City Departments to explore the creation of a City Cultural and Climate Innovation District for the South Shore/Barton Springs area including Butler Shores and surrounding South Austin cultural assets, by creating a plan and timeline inventory of assets and strategies to protect and enhance assets;

- traffic impact analysis;
- bicycle/multimodal transportation strategies; and
- outline of the community engagement process to support its creation.

Subsequent conversations related to the goals of this resolution provided the Department additional darity as it relates to intent and anticipated deliverables. The goal for the proposed framework is to leverage the cultural and park/ecological assets to coordinate activities, educate and entertain visitors, advance climate change resilience, and protect and preserve the district's assets.


in collaboration with the Economic Development Department and the Office of Sustainability, the Department conducted research to characterize the distinctive nature associated with a proposed City Cultural and Climate Innovation District. The separate summary definitions are as follows:

- Climate Innovation District- Co-location of academic, business, technology and civic innovators within a special zone where collaboration creates, refines and validates disruptive ideas to produce community benefits associated with climate resilience and environmental
- Cultural District- Special zones that harness the power of cultural resources to stimulate community revitalization. These districts could become focal points for attracting tourists,

In combination, a City Cultural and Climate Innovation District is defined as a distinct zone inclusive of cultural resources that promotes equity, Innovative environmental practices and climate resilience



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What's at Stake? What can the Innovation District Accomplish?



As the Butler Shores Area's commercial and residential development expands and grows, so does the population of residents along with mobility needs.



Growth is placing stress on the natural environment and is having a significant impact on the area's green spaces we rely on to thrive as a community.

- The area's cultural assets have never benefited from a coordinated and comprehensive
 assessment to address the area's competing needs or leverage the public investments to
 full effect.
- A CCID would explore and analyze these conditions and recommend planning to address the area's rapid transition due to private development, public investments for the DAC, transportation and mobility, and increasing population and density demands.

The CCID suggests an ongoing organizational structure and a framework for these cultural and environmental assets to move forward in time.





Innovation Ecosystem

"A key to the success of innovation districts is a willingness to observe, experiment with, and elevate what is great about the place where things are happening, where relationships are built, and ideas are germinated...."

Cultural

The public and private institutions, organizations and companies that drive, cultivate or support the Butler Shores Area's innovation-rich environment.

Social/Network

The relationships between actors—such as between individuals, firms, and institutions—that have the potential to generate, sharpen, and/or accelerate the advancement of ideas. This is a critical component that will facilitate and nurture innovation between the residents (commercial and residential).

Physical

The public and privately-owned spaces—buildings, open spaces, streets and other infrastructure—designed and organized to stimulate new and higher levels of connectivity, collaboration, and innovation. Neighborhood-building amenities provide important services to residents and workers in the district. This includes medical offices, grocery stores, restaurants, coffee bars, small hotels, and local retail (such as bookstores, clothing stores, and sports shops).





Building an Innovation District

Guiding Principle:

To elevate and celebrate the **values** of the Butler Shores Area, including arts, environment and climate.

The Butler Shores Area Cultural and Climate Innovation District (CCID)...

is defined as a distinct zone inclusive of cultural resources that promotes equity, innovative environmental practices and climate resilience principles.

A successful CCID plan will:

- be led by community leaders,
- seek to define the areas sense of place and cultural character,
- develop strategies to foster the co-existence of cultural programming and environmental sensitivity,
- develop strategies to enhance and protect both built and environmental assets, mobility and access innovations, and opportunities for cross-disciplinary interpretation.

To elevate and celebrate the **values** of the Butler Shores Area, including arts, environment and climate.

This planning effort will:

- Determine the level of interest in creating a Culture and Climate Innovation District;



- 6 campaign emails were sent to a list of over 300 area stakeholders (neighborhoods, community or civic organizations, cultural arts organizations, businesses, etc.) with follow up phone calls to those we had a phone number for.
- A Spanish-language focus group was scheduled for September 24 but was canceled due to lack of registrants.
- Contacted four additional stakeholders for a short interview.








Tell us about your relationship to the Butler Shores Area? (Check all that apply).

Answered: 10 Skipped: 8








What is your **level of interest** in creating a Culture and Climate Innovation District for the Butler Shores Area? (Check all that apply).

Answered: 18 Skipped: 0








How concerned are you about the rate of growth around the Butler Shores Area and its impact on traffic, transit, or general mobility?

Answered: 18 Skipped: 0








How concerned are you about the rate of growth around the Butler Shores Area and the impact its having on the natural environment and stress its placing on our public green spaces?

Answered: 18 Skipped: 0








Please rank the following factors from "1 - most concerning" to "5 - the least concerning" based on their impact to the Butler Shores Area.

Feedback on CCID Boundaries and Assets

Some participants had questions and concerns about proposed CCID boundaries and desired more clarity on purpose and goals before weighing in further on boundaries.

High-level Takeaways:



- Some confusion over the boundaries and why some private commercial properties are included but not residential areas.
- Suggestions to NOT include Zilker Park, since it has its own identity, vision, planning process and goals.
- Suggestions to include additional assets or areas included:
 - Lady Bird Lake
 - North side of Lady Bird Lake to Cesar Chavez to include Seaholm and Austin Public Library
 - Area up to Congress Avenue to include South Central Waterfront and Congress Avenue Bridge
 - Area up to I-35 to include Norwood house
 - Area to Pleasant Valley
- Suggestion to expand the area to include private property where future development could create value that could be included in a taxing district to raise revenue for the district.





Objectives and Values for the Environment

Many participants shared desired outcomes that would protect and enhance the environment and educate people about climate resilience strategies.

High-level Takeaways:



Objectives:

- Educate people about the environment, current challenges and how the District advances climate resilience goals.
- Preserve and enhance the environment, advance climate resilience strategies, protect parkland.
- Provide green transportation options.
- Use green strategies for maintenance and equipment.
- Help businesses and institutions adopt more green practices.
- Integrate green energy technology and water conservation practices into new construction and park infrastructure.

Values:

- Preserve what is there to make sure these are places for people (passive and recreational use) and that commercial interests don't dominate.
- Environmental stewardship, restoration and climate resiliency.
- Human connection to nature.
- Protecting habitat for wildlife and pollinators.
- Community engagement to foster stewardship.






Objectives and Values for the Cultural District

Participants also shared desired outcomes related to the cultural aspects of the District that would help connect the civic institutions, build community and foster arts and culture.

High-level Takeaways:



Objectives:

- Educate people about the culture, heritage and the true history of the area.
- Invest in infrastructure (i.e. streetscape improvements, traffic-taming strategies, signage and wayfinding) to strengthen the area as an economic driver.
- Host activation events (music, dance, art) to create an identity and show support.
- Foster greater coordination between cultural institutions (perhaps create a shared vision).

Values:

- Build community and bring people together.
- Create a place that is accessible and inviting to all people, which includes the programming at cultural centers and the naming of places.
- Equity is an important value.
- Art/ culture intersection with ecological integrity.





Objectives and Values for Access and Mobility

Many participants emphasized the importance of addressing mobility challenges and improving access to the area. There were mixed views about how to address parking, but overall support for multi-modal access to the area.

High-level Takeaways:



Objectives:

- Connect the area to public transportation hubs, future green parking garages, and other parking areas.
- Promote non-vehicular mobility and walkability.
- Increase parking.
- Make a plan that reduces traffic and parking within the CCID.
- Create a park and ride and better public transportation.
- Add "green" transportation from downtown to a properly defined CCID.
- Better bike lanes and safe bike parking and storage.
- Access for people who must arrive by car—and pullouts for ride sharing to keep traffic moving.

Values:

 Allow easy access to parkland and city amenities for people from all over.





Thoughts on Opportunities and Actions

Participants provided their thoughts on what opportunities or actions they felt would be useful to move the conversation forward.

High-level Takeaways:



- Wait until the Zilker Park Master Plan is complete.
- Exclude Zilker Park from the district.
- Wait until the Economic Development Department has finished its proposal on how to create districts.
- Clarify the purpose and set measurable goals.
- Define what kind of role the district would have (i.e. guidance, resource, regulation) and what being part of the district would mean.
- Determine how this will be funded and if a larger area is needed in order to provide sufficient funding.
- Provide precedent examples, especially of an innovation district that includes a major metropolitan park.
- Conduct community engagement prior to formally defining the district boundaries.
- Talk to the local artistic companies that use the arts spaces.
- Include local business owners and their customers.





Other Considerations Related to Purpose and Process

Participants expressed some confusion and concern related to this and other planning processes and a desire for more clarity regarding the purpose and goals of the CCID.

High-level Takeaways:



- Concerns that the CCID process will create confusion, preempt, or conflict with the Zilker Park Master Plan process and its outcomes.
- Overall lack of clarity on what the CCID's purpose and goals are, and what its regulatory control and structure will be.
- Concern that combining a climate and cultural district is overly ambitious, too broad, or has contradictory aims.


