MISSION

The Emma S. Barrientos Mexican American Cultural Center is dedicated to the preservation, creation, presentation, and promotion of the cultural arts of Mexican Americans and Latino Cultures.

ABOUT US

The Emma S. Barrientos Mexican American Cultural Center is a tremendous resource for the community and visitors to learn and participate in classes and programs that foster a meaningful understanding and appreciation of Mexican, Mexican American, Native American/ Indigenous and Latino cultures. The programs and education curriculum include visual arts, theatre, dance, literature, music, multi-media, and the culinary arts.

In 2007, The MACC* opened to the public upon completion of its "Phase 1" construction. In 2011, the center was named the "Emma S. Barrientos" Mexican American Cultural Center after Emma Serrato Barrientos (1942-2009) who worked as a political activist, community organizer, and cultural leader with her husband Gonzalo Barrientos, the first Mexican-American state representative from Travis County. This name honors Emma's work in promoting and providing space for Latin-American culture and art in Central Texas.

*We are known to the community as the ESB MACC or just the MACC and for the purpose of this report, we use "MACC" as an abbreviation.

PHASE 2 EXPANSION & RENOVATION

While the construction is going on, all MACC programs are held at other facilities all over Austin, taking the MACC right into the community! Locations in 2023 have included Recreation Centers like the Dove Springs and Pan American Centers, Senior Centers like Conley Guerrero, Austin libraries, elementary schools, and the Carver Museum and Asian American Resource Center. MACC staff works remotely and assists at those locations.

The 2018 Bond is funding Phase 2, which includes:

- Two new wings on either side of the building
- Cocina for culinary classes
- New gallery, music practice spaces
- Conference room, media center, EDU classrooms
- Extensive remodeling of the Zocalo plaza to differentiate it from the trail, improved functionality for outdoor events

The MACC building was designed be built in three phases:

- Phase 1: Completed in 2007 when the MACC opened to the public.
- Phase 1A: Completed in 2010- converted the Multipurpose Room to an Auditorium.
- Phase 2: Current construction started in early 2023 and will continue into 2025.
- Phase 3: To Be Determined

CAMINOS TEEN LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

Caminos is a paid internship in the arts for teens in the Austin area. In 2023, the 6th class of Caminos students, or "Caminantes", graduated in June and the new Class of 2024 commenced in alignment with the AISD school year in August. When the students graduate the program, many of them stay on to join the MACC staff and work as Camp counselors in the summer after their internship and sometimes beyond.

The new class of 2024 has already helped out during our Fall signature events, assisted with the Onion Creek mural, gone on field trips to a Mariachi festival and to the Bob Bullock Museum, and made zines reflecting on Dia de los Muertos and on their experiences at the museum! Planning for the Caminos annual Latinx Youth Conference focusing on mental health and teen-led spaces is underway.

"The Mariachi Festival was a very nice opportunity for people to come have fun and listen to music, see vendors, eat food, and just celebrate the culture. It's kind of like a big family or a group of friends, because I am seeing people see someone they know and that's really nice to see, like seeing connections in that way. Also, we are painting the kids' faces and it's really fun!" - Ruby, Caminos Class of 2024

What Is Your Austin?

The Caminos Class of 2023 created the "What is Your Austin?" Project. It was imagined and executed by the Caminantes over several months in the second half of their internship. They scouted locations, photographed them, wrote articles about them, and built a sculpture of a map of their favorite places in Austin with a key. The sculpture is a multi media collage on a 36" x 60" sheet of plywood.

Onion Creek Flood Mural Project

The class of 2024 teens learned about mural painting and local history by participating in the Onion

Creek Mural Project. They shadowed painter Alonso Estrada, who made the site -specific artwork in collaboration with Onion Creek flood survivors from 2015. The mural is inspired by an ancient Native American myth of a wild white horse that inhabited Onion Creek. It tells the story of the strength of the flood waters and the fortitude of the community members that survived as they struggled to save their neighbors.

ACADEMIA CUAUHTLI

Cuauhtli is a Saturday bilingual program for families that honors our community's cultural heritage, fosters a social justice consciousness, and reclaims our collective identities in pursuit of educational freedom. In addition to providing a cultural enrichment opportunity for children, we are developing our own critical consciousness, based on community and oriented towards social justice.

Saturday Sessions

Cuauhtli has 60 enrolled participants who regularly attend on Saturdays at Sanchez Elementary during the school year, with students joining from Sanchez, Perez, Houston, Travis Heights, Harris, and Hart Elementary schools. On Saturday, September 23rd, Cuauhtli organized their inaugural field trip to the Zilker Botanical Gardens where the children had the opportunity to learn about the native plants and wildlife in Austin.

HOLISTIC WELLNESS PROGRAM

MISSION STATEMENT

The Holistic Wellness Program attends to the needs of the total person while remaining rooted in our Latino/ Mexican American cultural identities. True wellness is a combination of Physical, Social, Environmental, Financial, Intellectual, Emotional/ Mental, Occupational, and Spiritual aspects and, like the diversity of our people, deserves to be nourished and cultivated to enrich individual lives and uplift our community.

HOLISTIC WELLNESS PROGRAM

The Holistic Wellness Program (HWP) was created in response to our building renovation and expansion closure. The MACC has been closed since December 2022 and is scheduled to re-open late 2025. HWP kicked off late January 2023 with the goal to address 8 different areas of wellness by offering free activities facilitated in both English and Spanish.

HWP will continue when the ESB-MACC re-opens in 2025 due to the overwhelmingly positive feedback from the community. The program's success has also led to the need for additional funding - participants are asking that we offer more activities and more frequently.

I have discovered my love for kayaking and hope to continue on my own."

Tamalada

In December we hosted a "Tamalada", a tamale making event at the Conley Guerrero Senior Center. The event included cooking demonstrations, tastings, recipe sharing, & corn husk doll making. Attendees enjoyed learning about the Mexican tradition of coming together to make tamales during the holiday season.

Theater, Film Screenings, and Pláticas

All film screenings were free and open to the public in 2023! In April, we screened *Mama Irene*, about a Peruvian healer in the Andes. This is not only a vital document of endangered wisdom; it is also a story about Woman empowerment and how to live in harmony with Mother Earth. This is a story about a woman who overcomes tremendous trauma and obstacles - yet continues to grow and inspire at age 84.

In August, we screened *The Graduates* at LLILAS Benson Latin American Studies and Collections. The film explores pressing issues in education today through the eyes of six Latino/a students from across the US. This film offers first-hand perspectives on key challenges facing the students, their families, educators, and community leaders, and it included a talk-back with Director Bernardo Ruiz.

Taller Abierto

We took this popular program out into the community! The master teaching artist Miguel Santana taught painting in libraries, rec centers, & at event pop-ups! The follow-along class Includes both art history and exploration of different art techniques.

Cine de Oro

Hosted on the last Tuesday of the month, this program has been held at the Conley Guerrero Senior Center & Doris Miller Auditorium. Attendees are treated to a free screening of films from the golden age of Mexican cinema and a complimentary lunch. November's film was Marcelino Pan y Vino in Spanish with English subtitles.

HEALING GARDEN

Our healing garden has been moved! Temporarily relocated to Sunset Valley Organic Community Garden. Garden programming has included our annual Day of Wellness, herbalism with Jesus Garcia, and nature hikes.

In the garden: Sage, lemongrass, lavender, chamomile, rosemary, mint, and more!

COLLABORATIONS AT PAN PARK

Pan Am Hillside Summer Concert Series

We collaborated with the Oswaldo A.B. Cantu / Pan American Recreation Center to co-present concerts at the Pan Am Hillside theatre. This is Austin's longest- running outdoor concert series, over 30 years old! The final concert saw record attendance and despite the heat, couples couldn't help but dance to the Tejano Tunes.

MexAmeriCon

On November 4th, we hosted the 6th annual MexAmeriCon, Austin's first Latinx/Mexican American Comic Con. A free event that showcases local Latinx graphic artists and provides networking opportunities and a giant "artist alley" for attendees to shop graphic novels, zines, board games, and original artworks.

La Mujer Mosaic Mural Unveiling

We officially inaugurated the La Mujer mosaic mural as a permanent outdoor installation on April 29th, 2023. It was created by participants in our Caminos Teen Leadership Program under the guidance of local muralist J Muzacz and Caminos founder Frederico Geib. This beautiful mural is truly representative of our community. It is located on the Southeast corner of the MACC, by the Ann and Roy Butler Hike & Bike trail.

The mural was designed and created tile by tile to depict strong Latina leaders; *mujeres* that have inspired our teens to reach their greatest potential. Some of the iconic role models featured in the mural include Selena Quintanilla, Dolores Huerta, and Emma Barrientos. The mural celebrates their courage and success as trailblazers in art, music, and dance as well as their dual roles of activists, mothers, and community leaders.

AWARDS OF EXCELLENCE

This ceremony took place on July 29th at the Long Center. Established in 2009 by the MACC Advisory Board, this award recognizes remarkable Mexican Americans, Latino/a/e/x, and Chicano/a/e/x for the highest artistic excellence they bring to the cultural arts of Austin, Texas.

We had open nominations from May 5 to June 30. Mayor Kirk Watson and MACC Advisory Board Members were present. Each winner's names will be engraved on the *Pétalos* wall in the new MACC building!

VIVA MEXICO

MEXICAN INDEPENDENCE DAY

The ESB MACC's 16th annual Viva Mexico celebration took place at the Oswaldo A.B. Cantu/ Pan American Recreation Center on Saturday, September 16th, 2023. Guests at this free outdoor event enjoyed Mariachi and Ballet Folklorico performances, live Tejano and Country music, and a local youth talent showcase.

The biggest event that the MACC does every year is arguably the most beloved, especially by families! A celebration of the cycle of life, we hosted two Day of the Dead celebrations in 2023- one at Oakwood Cemetery and one at Oswaldo A.B. Cantu/ Pan American Recreation Center.

We hosted our large-scale celebration for Day of the Dead at the Pan American Rec Center. We partnered with MexAmeriCon who showcased over 50 Mexican American artists. We provided free face painting, our annual Sugar skull decorating workshop, and interactive sculpture installations by Las Piñatas ATX.
