

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Exercise: Keep, Toss, Create



1. Keep: The participants were asked what the enjoy most at the Carver.

The replies covered multiple concerns:

a) Idea of the Building:

Juneteenth statues are important to the community and the building experience and needs to be highlighted more.

The participants conveyed the importance of the museum to the community and how it stands as the main attraction in the Carver complex.

b) Experience:

The participants feel that the Carver staff treats the members of the community very well and make them feel welcomed.

c) <u>Programs:</u>


The participants also enjoyed the summer programming - in theater or music at the Carver.

Children's theater is also enjoyed by the community.


d) Spaces in the building:

The participants like the outdoor spaces at the Carver that enables large-scale gathering of people.

2. Toss: The participants were asked what they appreciate the least or dislike the most about the Carver?

The replies elaborated on various issues:

e) <u>Image/Branding:</u>

The participants conveyed that the Carver is an important icon for the African American community in Austin and could be branded to reflect the significance it holds. It was suggested that the name could be possibly be changed to something along the lines of - the African American Cultural and Heritage Center.

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It was conveyed by the participants that the story of the community in Austin, the Carver and the various buildings/institutions of importance to the community need to be threaded together into a deliberate narrative that reflects the community's history and connections to the city.

f) <u>Way finding:</u>

The participants mentioned that sometimes the facilities of the Carver are hard to access due to lack of space.

g) <u>Maintenance:</u>


The craver needs to improve maintenance. There are a lot of spaces that are leaking.

h) Design and utilization:

The lobby is not well suited for large-scale events

The participants felt that the Carver does not have enough space for all the events currently taking place here.

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3. Create: The participants were asked what programs or upgrades they would like to see here.

The replies can be categorized as follows:

i) <u>Ideas:</u>

The Carver must posit itself a stronger representation of the African American community and heritage in Austin

The Carver should be 'a place to be desired' that draws people/visitors from all over the country.

Branding/Narrative – The Carver needs to be better connected to the other organizations, institutions and buildings that speak to the community's heritage and narrative in the city of Austin. It should be located at the epicenter of an interwoven experience. It must present itself as the heart of an African American cultural district.

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The participants suggested that the new design should remember the historic African American faith community that exists in Austin. There are several churches that are around 150 years old and should be represented within the center.

The Carver must provide an environment for the community where they can do anything, they wish for.

j) <u>Programming:</u>

The Carver must be a place for young people to learn different things that are not just STEM related. The center could help children develop a good relationship between growing healthy food and physical wellness. Ideas of nutrition, health and wellbeing could be imbibed into young minds that come here.

k) <u>Design:</u>

The participants expressed a desire to see more outdoor space in the Carver center that can accommodate large scale festivals that are dear to the community.

Improving access to the buildings (physical access, time, and space).

More meeting spaces are needed - indoors and outdoors.

The existing education center could be expanded to include food science education, history of the community, farming, etc.

Some of the participants suggested that the new design include a big commercial size kitchen.

The venue must be designed to hold events of 200-300 people and a theater that can seat about 500 people comfortably.

The new Carver to have a strong sense of presence, connected to the streetscape around it and the library nearby.

The library could be expanded and can turn into a great resource for the children of the community and the future.


Addition of space to the Carver could enable it to be a part of festivals in the city such as South by Southwest.


More programmed space to be supplemented with adequate parking facilities.
