





Site and Building History

- Original 1890s school at nearby location destroyed by flood.
- New building established on site in mid-1930s on land donated to Travis County by St. Edward's Baptist Church.
- Travis County transferred ownership to Austin Public Schools in 1952.
- Until 1954, Brown v. Board of Education, public education was racially segregated by law.
- School closed in 1962 when Austin Public Schools formally began integration of schools.
- Building served as Montopolis Church of Christ from mid 1960s until 1980s.
- Portion of Montopolis Church of Christ tract purchased and adjacent tract with St. Edwards Baptist Church condemned through eminent domain for Grove Blvd Extension in 1986-87, which was never constructed.





Community Advocacy & Acquisition by the City of Austin (2015-2017)

- 2015: 500 Montopolis Dr. purchased by real estate development firm
- 2016: Property owner files demolition permit and community advocated strongly for the building and site's preservation. Historic Landmark Commission recommends initiation of historic zoning, but item failed to pass due to lack of super majority
- 2017: Owner agreed to historic designation for the building on the condition that the development would be granted a zoning change for denser development
- 2017: Ultimately, council determined that 500 Montopolis Dr deserved to not just be preserved, but placed into the public realm and transformed into a museum



Community Advocacy & Acquisition by the City of Austin (2018-2019)

- 2018: City unable to agree with owner on purchase price for property and therefore, directs that the building and site be acquired through eminent domain
- 2019: City successful in completing eminent domain proceedings and takes possession of 500 Montopolis Dr; developer appeals monetary award and litigation continues until 2022

Building Clean-up & Funds for Planning (2020)

- 2020: PARD completes protective measures for building; sensitive materials stored in climate-controlled space, provides on site storage for non-fixed furniture, completes pest and vermin exclusion, and completes hazardous material abatement
- 2020: PARD requests and receives \$150K from Austin Parks Foundation to develop a concept plan for the school property















Community Meetings and Open House (2021)

- Sept. 21, 2021: PARD Director McNeeley meets with members of Montopolis community to discuss approach to planning process
- Nov. 6, 2021: Community Open House; Austin Transportation invited to attend and gather feedback on Grove Blvd extension











Planning discussion (2022-present)


- **February-July 2022**: PARD staff meets with Montopolis CDC to develop a Certificate of Exemption enabling PARD to directly contract with CDC to lead planning process.
- July 2022: Montopolis CDC requests a partnership agreement instead of contract for planning. Discussions continued into 2024. No contract to date.
- September 4, 2024: Community meeting to discuss next steps.





Expand & Dedicate Parkland Around Site (2022-2023)

- June 2022: The Grove Blvd extension formally removed from Austin Strategic Mobility Plan, allowing PARD to pursue parkland dedication for adjacent tract
- December 2022: PARD funds and coordinates boundary survey to support parkland dedication of Montopolis School and St. Edwards Church Tract
- **September 2023:** Councilmember Velasquez sponsors parkland dedication item
