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

SHOAL CREEK

Its' tranquil and turbulent waters serve as a destination for park users and as a force of nature quiring bank stabilization and rinarian reforestation. Over 80% of the Pease Park Master Plans



1 THE BLUFFS

A piece of Hill Country in the City, the 40' high bluffs are a natural geologic landmark unique to the rest of the park. Cat Hole and Blue Hole are famous hideouts along The Bluffs that play prominent role in the cultural lore of Austin. The Bluffs suffer from bank erosion and an infest



2 LAMAR TERRACE

Characterized by level terrain out of the floodplain, Lamar Terrace is an unprogrammed open space with access to Lamar Boulevard and 29th St. Lamar Terrace is home to a sewer intercep which runs through the center of the terrace.



3 RAMBLE SCRAMBLE

The steep slope forest canopy of the Ramble Scramble is dominated by the live oak, cedar elm ashe juniper while the understory is being taken over by young non-native invasive plants. Ram Scramble is home to Split Rock, a huge boulder that split into two forming a forty-foot canyon



4 IAMAR SLOPE

Often confused as a right-of-way for Lamar Boulevard, Lamar Lawn is a narrow open space will access only from the Lamar sidewalk. The Lamar Lawn presents an opportunity for riparian rest ration and stormwater infiltration along Lamar Boulevard.



5 EAST BANK East Bank is home to some of the steepest slopes in Pease Park which serve to funnel and dire views while driving along Lamar Boulevard. The wooden hillside is dominated by a cedar elm c

opy but suffers from hillside erosion and abundance of non-native invasive plants



6 GASTON GREEN

As the heart of the dog park, Gaston Green is the central open space north of 24th St. With er trances from Shoal Creek Boulevard and Gaston St., it is one of the few locations where you α



7 LIVE OAK TERRACE

The presence of mature live oaks and closely mowed herbaceous vegetation characterize the oriparian space of the Live Oak Terrace. At the heart of the terrace is a stone bench triangle nest amongst the trunks of three live oaks.



8 WOOTEN WOODS

- I support the uses for the Tudor cottage- either seasonal care or small rental space (like the zilker club house). I think the current bathroom building is inadequate and unattainable while I love modern architecture in this setting I think classic American park is an appropriate direction for any additional structures. Don't lose any current open/mowed fields they are loved and used. Please do not bring back disc golf too much damage to the trees. Splash pad- I think the current splash pad looks a little bit gimmicky. The one at eastwoods is much more understated and affective. Also I don't like seeing all the mechanical through the mesh wall. That should be screened better somehow.
- Parking? have any parking studies been done? This should be a yearlong review. For example, mid-summer is too hot and parking is fine usually. Like now in early spring on a weekend day there is no parking 2) the parkway entrance and dangerous traffic at odd times like evenings in football season there's no parking, much drinking, and traffic for House Park across Lamar. There are often children and other pedestrians crossing and fast traffic which is a bad mix. Humps have been mentioned. They are an ugly and un-inspired solution. What about varied paving's (Cobblestone Section). Rainbow and parkway would be an ideal location for a roundabout. And has anyone perused the option of taking over the streets of parkway and Kingsbury as a true park road.
- I walk with my dogs in Pease Park from Kingsbury and 27th street nearly every-day, sometimes twice a day on the weekends for at least 10 years. The park is getting more populated, full with students from west campus and the neighborhood. There are also a number of fitness classes, with a number of students. Pease is well used. When the disk golfers used the park it was somewhat being over-used: this was evident by the destruction of plant and grass and a large amount of bone rock and a distressed look to the park. Not to say anything bad about disk golfers who were universally good people. Unfortunately this area doesn't seem to work well with disk golf. I agree that the number 1 goal should be to restore ecological processes to provide a peaceful and useful greenbelt. It would be nice to have more flowering plants; the entire park should be no leash I have not ever seen any issues with dog on dog or dog to dog. There is no reason to force dogs to be on leashes.



 Rain-water collection- in the park for some of the watering of the plants. I am very excited about the future of Pease Park. I live in Pemberton and love to walk to the park.



The Places of Pease Park

PEASE PARK MASTER PLAN

Think of Pease Park as a necklace, with sixteen green gems, each with its own character, strung along Shoal Creek. These sixteen gems are defined as landscape character zones, and along with Lamar Boulevard and Kingsbury/Parkway illustrate the variety of places and experiences within Pease Park.





As one of the seven creeks in Austin, Shoal Creek is the central spine flowing through Pease Park Its' tranquil and turbulent waters serve as a destination for park users and as a force of nature re quiring bank stabilization and riparian reforestation. Over 80% of the Pease Park Master Plan site s within the Shoal Creek Floodplain.



1 THE BLUFFS

A piece of Hill Country in the City, the 40° high bluffs are a natural geologic landmark unique to the rest of the park. Cat Hole and Blue Hole are famous hideouts along The Bluffs that play a prominent role in the cultural lore of Austin. The Bluffs suffer from bank erosion and an infesta-

3 RAMBLE SCRAMBLE

The steep stope forest canopy of the Ramble Scramble is dominated by the live oak, cedar elm and ashe juniper while the understory is being taken over by young non-native invasive plants. Ramble Scramble is home to Split Rock, a huge boulder that split into two forming a forty-foot canyon.



Often confused as a right-of-way for Lamar Boulevard, Lamar Lawn is a narrow open space with access only from the Lamar sidewalle. The Lamar Lawn presents an opportunity for riparian resto-ration and stormwater infiltration along Lamar Boulevard.

6 GASTON GREEN

Home to Lamar Knoll, Mesquite Grove and the popular volleyball courts, Polecat Hollow is the largest open space on the east side of Shoal Creek with sturning views of Downtown Austin.

12 WINDSOR HILLSIDE

At one of the highest elevations above Shall Creek, Windsor Hillside typifies the dry-mesic slope forest and woodland of the Edwards Plateau. This upland hillside suffers from an abundance of non-native invasive plants.



13 NORTH RAMBLE

North Ramble is a Texas ash and ashe juniper dominated slope forest that suffers from hillside erosion. Like its neighbor, Hillside, North Ramble is home to many of the park's hiking and nature

Kingbury Commons is the recreational heart and cultural isoul of Pease Pair. It is home to the playground and splashpad as well as the Historic Tudor Cottage and conci princit tables. LAMAR BOULEVARD

Lamar Boulevard parallels the Shoal Creek for nearly two miles along the eastern frontage of Pease Park. With over 75,000 commuters a day and counting, Lamar Boulevard is a transportation artery that presents several challenges for Pease Park in terms of pedestrian connectivity, stormwater management and utility restrictions.



KINGSBURY / PARKWAY

Together Kingsbury and Parkway form the western frontage of Pease Park. The two lane roads present an opportunity to connect Pease Park with the neighborhoods while defining what the character of a park mad can be












