

Austin Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights

The Parks and Recreation Department, along with dozens of partner organizations, created the Austin Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights (COBOR) in 2016

- In 2017, Austin City Council unanimously voted to pass the COBOR with the support of more than 1,000 citizens, key partners such as Austin Independent School District, and Mayor Steve Adler.
- We believe Austin has a vested interest in ensuring all children in our city have the opportunity to connect with the natural world and help create the next generation of environmental stewards who will conserve Austin's quality outdoor space.



YOUTH LEADERSHIP

Vision: Collaborating to build an Austin in which young people can easily access careers in outdoors, nature, and the environment, are fairly compensated for their contributions, and that the field, and leadership within, represents the communities we serve

YOUTH LEADERSHIP

- Participants:
 - 45 participants from 16 org.
 - 41 zip codes
 - > 55% ages 16-24
 - 44% non-White (Black/African-American, Asian-American and Pacific Islander, and Latinx/Hispanic)
- Continued co-facilitation of meetings with youth
- Normalize talking about race & racism with stakeholders, partners, participants, leadership
- Hosted 2 trainings on equitable hiring practices, with 42 total participants

- Creating pathways into nature-based jobs with organizations (Austin Civilian Conservation Corp, Youth Forest Council, Austin Youth River Watch):
 - ACCC (Internal Pathways): 38 summer temp jobs at COA, 13 continued/still employed
 - YFC: hired 13 interns
 - AYRW: hired 10 interns (5 returning interns + 5 new interns); half of our current intern cohort are former Riverwatch students

GREEN SCHOOL PARKS

- Green Administrator Cohort conducted in partnership with EcoRise and Austin ISD to support green campus initiatives
- Joint Use Agreement content finalized
- Coordinating between PARD + AISD on upcoming AISD Bond, which will impact about 6 joint use school parks
- Completed all data analysis for Robert Wood Johnson Foundation grant, studying the impact of green infrastructure installed as part of the GSP program. Final conclusions include:
 - As temperatures rise, children decrease physical activity and seek shade
 - Children's connection to nature had a significant positive effect on their:
 - -Overall SEL skills
- -Self management

-Self-awareness

-Relationship skills

GREEN SCHOOL PARKS

- GSP Designation process and form created (signs, marketing to roll out in August)
- APF volunteer days to maintain GSP gardens, trees, trails, etc.
- Outdoor seating installed at all campuses through CARES funding from District; outdoor classrooms installed at 6 joint use sites through APF Grant
- Purchased new park amenities and finalized placement for joint use sites
- Principal Q+A started during GSP Committee meetings, with at least 2 Principals attending every meeting



GREEN School Park!

This schoolyard supports nature and encourages outdoor learning with features like gardens, an outdoor classroom, rain water collection, and more!

As a Green School Park, this space is open and accessible to the public outside of school hours. When school is out, come enjoy this area as a place to play, learn, and gather!

NATURE PLAY

- Published Nature Play Guidelines to assist City staff and partners in the design, installation, maintenance, and management of nature play spaces.
- Installed 3 nature play space, in partnership with Austin Parks Foundation, at MLK Station, Kendra Page, and Grand Meadow Neighborhood Parks
- Added nature play into PARD Standard Amenity Guide for all staff, park adopters to reference
- Developed Maintenance checklist, observation criteria, and wood degradation process for all new nature play spaces
- Loose parts lending kits re-started, with kits checked out 22 times
- Secured PARD Mitigation funds to cover the cost of moving logs
- Infrastructure Subcommittee quarterly meetings, providing space for staff and partners to discuss best practices for nature play


