Fresh Chefs Society Apprenticeship - Youth interested in learning more about a career in the culinary field are paired with a community chef, caterer or restaurant for hands-on educational cooking experiences. Youth will work alongside the chef, learning the meal and menu preparation process, from conceptualization to presentation and serving.

Fresh Chefs Society In the Community - This program aims to get the community involved with foster care youth who are preparing for independent living. Community businesses, restaurants, venues, farms, caterers and foodies will have the opportunity to host and participate in events that spotlight youth, provide cooking classes and fairs, and build support and raise awareness.

The Home Cook Mentor Program - Volunteers are paired with a youth who is interested in learning about cooking at home. The mentor meets the youth at their home at least once a month and they cook a meal together. The Home Cook Mentor also attends monthly Fresh Chefs Potlucks with the youth, where they can showcase a meal they prepared together.

iCook - Youth participate in a series of educational seminars that provide the basic knowledge needed to cook independently and healthily. The seminars will address what’s needed to cook daily, how to cook inexpensively, where to find food and how to prepare it. Each youth who successfully completes the program will be given their own “Kitchen Start Up Kit”, filled with essentials to begin their eating lifestyle.

It’s On Fresh Chefs - It’s On Fresh Chefs is focused on celebrating success. Fresh Chefs Society takes youth who have accomplished an important milestone on their journey to adulthood to a special meal at a community restaurant.

Workplace Justice Program - Offers education and training for workers and small employers in employment issues such as basic rights, safety, discrimination, and the Family Medical Leave Act, assistance in recovering back wages for workers who have been denied payment for their work, assistance to injured workers in receiving medical attention and compensation.

Community Organizing for Change - Focuses on engaging members in civic participation that seeks to achieve positive social change, such as with voter registration and candidate forums, developing the leadership skills of grassroots community members to better advocate themselves and their communities. WDP achieves this through 10-week leadership courses for its constituents, creating leadership outlets where WDP members can come together to address serious workplace issues at a systemic level. Earlier this year WDP’s members were successful in winning the passage of a rest break ordinance for construction workers by Austin City Council—the first of its kind in the state.
