To Stakeholder, Property Owner, or Resident:

The Austin Transportation Department (ATD) is conducting a public engagement process for proposed improvements on Berkman Drive from 51<sup>st</sup> Street to US 290. Funding in the amount of \$60,000 has been identified by the Austin City Council District 4 to make near term improvements on this segment of Berkman Drive. Additional funding from the 2016 Mobility Bond Safe Routes to School and Bikeways Local Mobility Programs is also contributing to this project. This is a notice of an upcoming public meeting to share proposed solutions based on community feedback gathered from two previous meetings, April 18<sup>th</sup> and June 30<sup>th</sup> of 2016.

The following is a high level summary of feedback from the first and second public meetings for Berkman Drive as well as feedback provided by residents of Windsor Park to the District 4 Council Office:

- Berkman is very busy during the morning and afternoon peak periods
- There are backups and safety issues due to heavy left turns at certain intersections and locations including Greenbrook Parkway, Rogge Lane, Ridgehaven Drive, Briarcliff Boulevard, Wheless Lane, and Patton Lane to US 290
- Drivers use the bike lane as a passing lane instead of waiting for people to make a left turn creating an unpredictable situation for all roadway users
- There are infrequent safe pedestrian crossings on Berkman Drive and desire for improvements at Greenbrook Parkway, Rogge Lane, near the Windsor Village retail area, Wheless Lane, and Patton Lane

- There are visibility issues caused by on-street parking at Broadmoor Drive
- There are issues with the southbound merge at the Berkman Drive and US 290 intersection

- The southbound bicycle lanes from Greenbrook Parkway to 51<sup>st</sup> Street are made uncomfortable by heavy motor vehicle volumes turning right onto 51<sup>st</sup> Street
- Conflicts with simultaneous left turns from Berkman Drive onto Wheless Drive (southern) and into the Memorial United Methodist Church parking lot
- Desire for calming traffic speeds on Berkman Drive

The upcoming public meeting will include a specific proposal for changes to the street and will offer tools proposed at desired locations to address issues raised including, but not limited to, the following:

- Adding or extending turn lanes at high turn locations to address backups and safety issues
- Adding physical protection to the buffered bicycle lane to prevent darting around turning vehicles and to provide physical protection for people on bikes
- Improving pedestrian crossings with median refuge islands at Greenbrook Parkway, Broadmoor Drive, Ridgehaven Drive, Glenvalley Drive (Safe Routes to School), and Patton Lane; and a pedestrian hybrid beacon at Rogge Drive/Suffolk Lane (Safe Routes to School)
- Changing on-street parking to provide turn lanes and address visibility issues
- Driveway modifications for Memorial United Methodist Church to align with Wheless Lane



These tools have the potential to improve safety and mobility for all users of the street. Between 2010 and 2015, a total of 97 crashes, including one fatal crash, occurred on this segment of Berkman Drive involving five people walking, four people bicycling and 88 people in motor vehicles.

ATD is seeking feedback on current issues with Berkman Drive and the proposed solutions to address these issues from local residents and other users of this street. You can obtain additional information about this mobility project and provide
