The Phase 2 Expansion and Renovation is funded by the 2018 Bond. The anticipated grand opening of the renovated building is set for Fall 2025.





The ESB MACC extended the Caminos program in 2024! Graduates of the program with exceptional leadership skills were invited back for a second year as a "senderistas", serving as mentors for the next class. They took part in the interview panels for the next cohort of Caminantes, as well as participate in events and outreach. They are given the title of ambassadors of Latinx culture and their employment with the ESB MACC is scheduled around their school, college, or work schedule.

ACADEMIA CUAUHTLI

Cuauhtli is a Saturday bilingual program for families that honors our community's cultural heritage, fosters a social justice consciousness, and reclaims our collective identities in pursuit of educational freedom.



In addition to providing a cultural enrichment opportunity for children, we are developing our own critical consciousness, based on community and oriented towards social justice.

Academia Cuauhtli Interlocal Agreement

In October 2024, an Interlocal Agreement was approved by the Austin Parks and Recreation Board, the AISD Board of Trustees, and City Council. This will allow Academia Cuauthli programs to continue with access to shared resources as budget allows.

SATURDAY SESSIONS

Academia Cuauhtli was excited to launch its Saturday bilingual cultural arts program at Sanchez Elementary! Led by AISD master dual-language teachers, the classes offered instruction in Mexican American Studies, Tejano Studies, Bilingual/Dual Language courses, Environmental Studies, Curanderismo, and Danza Mexica. The program ran from September 28th to March 8th, and we were thrilled to welcome around 60 students from Title 1 AISD schools, including Sanchez, Perez, Houston, Travis Heights, Harris, and Hart Elementary Schools.

This year, we planned exciting excursions, such as visiting buffalo with the Texas Tribal Buffalo Project, learning about water preservation at the Meadows Center in San Marcos, Texas, and participating in the Viva La Vida parade hosted by the Mexic-Arte Museum. Additionally, we continued our parent support program with resource workshops led by Ana Carrasco, and we were happy to offer free breakfast and transportation for families.

EDUCATION WITH HEART

Education with Heart: A Community Celebration invited Dove Springs families and educators to have conversations on bilingual education, celebrate young performing artists, and provide educational resources.

Keynote speeches were given by District 2 Councilmember Vanessa Fuentes, Superintendent Matias Segura, UT Austin Dean of College of Education Charles Martinez, AISD Trustee Ofelia Zapata, and UT professors Angela Valenzuela and Emilio Zamora.

Performances included Travis and Akins student Mariachis, Perez Elementary dance team, traditional Aztec blessings and dances, and singers Erika Santana and John Michael; young Texas musicians with bright futures ahead of them!

AZTECH KIDZ CODE SUMMER CAMP

A culturally sustaining, Indigenous-based STEM program for third to eighth grade Austin Independent School District students. Through this program, students learn coding, video game design, and Danza Mexica in both Spanish and English. During the summer, we offered three two-week sessions, with about 65 participants for the entire summer. Through culturally relevant STEM programming, we are addressing inequities in student exposure to career and workforce opportunities in early education, particularly for Indigenous, Latinx, and bilingual students.

This summer, students participated in a variety of activities, including learning introductory coding concepts in JavaScript, creating personal collages reflecting their past, present, and future, and learning traditional dances indigenous to Mexico, such as Danza Mexica and Son Jarocho. Additionally, students created chimallis (shields used in traditional Danza Mexica), decorating them with feathers, beads, and an Nahuatl symbol or essence that resonated with them. Students also went on several excursions, including the Carros y Cultura exhibit at the Bullock Museum to explore community storytelling, art, and lowrider culture. Furthermore, students had the opportunity to view 500-year-old artifacts, thanks to Maribel Falcon at the LLILAS Benson Library Archives.

ABOUT THE HWP PROGRAM

The Holistic Wellness Program (HWP) was created in response to our building renovation and expansion closure, launching late January 2023 with the goal to address 8 different areas of wellness by offering free activities across Austin facilitated in both English and Spanish.





The Holistic Wellness Program attends to the needs of the total person while remaining rooted in our Latino/ Mexican American cultural identities. True wellness is a combination of Physical, Social, Environmental, Financial, Intellectual, Emotional/ Mental, Occupational, and Spiritual aspects and, like the diversity of our people, deserves to be nourished and cultivated to enrich individual lives and uplift our community
