What is an Urban Forest? An urban forest is a collection of trees in cities, towns, and suburbs.

What is a heritage tree? A heritage tree, according to the City of Austin is a tree that has a diameter of 24 inches or more, is 4.5 feet above ground prior to developments, and is one of the following species:

> All Oaks American Elm Arizona Walnut Bald Cypress Bigtooth Maple Cedar Elm Eastern Black Walnut Pecan Texas Ash Texas Madrone

1 - Sunshine

Common Name: Southern Live Oak Scientific Name: Quercus virginiana Fun Fact: A mature tree can absorb up to 150 kg of CO2 per year.

2 - Rainbow

Common Name: Southern Live Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus virginiana

Fun Fact: Spending time near trees improves physical and mental health.

3 - Cowboy

Common Name: American Elm

Scientific Name: Ulmus Americana

Fun Fact: Trees absorb and block noise from the urban environment.

4 - Squishy

Common Name: American Elm

Scientific Name: Ulmus Americana

Fun Fact: Shade from urban trees can cool the air up to 8 degrees Celsius, reducing energy use.





17 - Waffles



Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus rubra

Fun Fact: The number of trees in East Austin is significantly less than in West Austin due to the historical redlining of low income BIPOC communities. 18 - Zorro

Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus rubra

Fun Fact: Named after the fox family often spotted in this courtyard during online learning. "Zorro" means "fox" in Spanish.

14 - Chloro-Phil

Common Name: American Elm

Scientific Name: Ulmus Americana

Fun Fact: Trees communicate with each other through fungus underneath the soil called mycorrhizal networks.



15 - Seymour

Common Name: Southern Live Oak Scientific Name: Quercus virginiana Fun Fact: Wood from southern live

oaks is so tough that a ship during the War of 1812 made of southern live oak survived multiple cannon fires. It was nicknamed "Old Ironside."

16 - Eden

Common Name: Southern Live Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus virginiana

Fun Fact: There are two main types of tree roots: anchoring roots and feeder roots. Anchoring roots are much deeper in the soil to add strength to the tree. Feeder roots are near the surface and absorb water and nutrients.





6 - McStickems

Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus rubra

Fun Fact: Large trees are excellent filters for urban pollutants and fine particulates.

7 - Mushroom

Common Name: American Elm

Scientific Name: Ulmus Americana

Fun Fact: American Elms used to be the most common street tree until Dutch Elm Disease wiped out most of the population.





Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Ouercus rubra

Fun Fact: Named after the heartwood of trees, which is the supporting pillar of the tree.





8 - Nelson

Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus rubra

Fun Fact: Named after our amazing band director since 1980, Ms. Carol Nelson. Thank you for all of your years of dedication and education.

9 - Ken

Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus rubra

Fun Fact: Named after the delightful Kenneth Sterling, a Mac custodian. Thank you for making us smile. And thank you to all of our custodians.







Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus rubra

Fun Fact: Oak wilt is killing oak trees in Central Texas in epidemic proportions. You can spot oak wilt when the leaves turn to an autumn color in summer, or when fungal mats form underneath the bark.

12 - Gaia

Common Name: Red Oak

Scientific Name: Quercus rubra

Fun Fact: Austin's urban forest currently has over 33 million trees.



10 - Groot

Common Name: American Elm

Scientific Name: Ulmus Americana

Fun Fact: Trees help reduce the urban heat island effect, which is when urban areas are significantly warmer than surrounding rural areas because of human activities.



13 - Elmer

Common Name: American Elm

Scientific Name: Ulmus Americana

Fun Fact: You can tell this is an American Elm by its oval leaves with jagged edges. Usually one side of the leaf is shorter than the other, giving it a lopsided look.
